Spinach and Rhubarb Is Plentiful—Butter and Eggs Steady Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 2 (AP)—Local wholesale vegetable markets were not marked by anything of outstanding importance at the commencement of the week's trading, although prices were generally a little easier on seasonal green stuffs. Supplies were liberal of most commodities, with plenty of local spinach and rhubarb in evidence. Oregon rhubarb going to the trade at 6 1/2 c per pound.

Potatoes were steady at prevailing prices. Burbanks around \$1.15 and Yukima and Deschutes Netted Gums around \$1.55 to \$2.15 for No. 1s.

Best grades of Oregon yellow Danvers were moving at \$2.25 to \$4 per cwt., but large quantities of lower grades sold at all kinds of prices.

Supplies of Umpqua valley broccoli were somewhat lighter and prices were firm at \$1.25 to \$1.50 for No. 1 stuff. The season is rapidly nearing a close, shippers report, and not much more is expected after this week.

Poultry and country dressed meat markets were decidedly steady at the opening today with little stock carried over from Saturday on hand.

Receipts of broiler chickens and fat colored hens showed indications of picking up a little but supplies are still unusually short and demand active. Unless shipments increase materially within the next few days, dealers look for substantially higher prices on account of the heavy Easter demand. No changes in quotations on other poultry or dressed meats were announced today, however.

Butter and eggs likewise were steady at Saturday's figures and receipts of both continued heavy. Withdrawal of outside buyers from the butter market during the last week coupled with the seasonal heaviness of receipts has caused considerable accumulation of butter on dealers' floors, and slight declines in prices were looked for late today.

Bears Control Stock Exchange Trading Today

NEW YORK, Apr. 2 (AP)—Frequent reversals of price movement took place in today's stock market as control shifted from "bear" to "bull" traders. Opening prices were reactionary, but the market soon headed upward as pools resumed activities on a broad scale and lifted more than two score issues to new peak prices for the year.

Trading failed to keep pace with the 4,000,000 share sessions last week. Marking up of the call money rate, coincident with the calling of about \$15,000,000 in loans was attributed to the heavy demand for funds in connection with quarterly settlements.

Tadpole fell from \$126.50 to \$118 within 15 minutes. General Motors, which had rallied from \$114 to \$127.25, quickly slipped back to \$115.25 and American International, Allied Chemical, Montgomery Ward and Sears Roebuck sold down \$2 and \$2 a share below Saturday's final quotations.

Among the many issues which had pushed into new high ground in the early upswing were St. Paul common and preferred, Great Northern preferred, Gulf Oil, American Ice, Best and company, Park and Ford, Gillette Safety Razor, American Safety Razor, Curtiss Aeroplane and Wright Aeronautical, the last named soaring \$8.50 to \$18.15.
