 of American trans-Atlantic mail by airship.
 The R-100 will cross the Atlantic on the easterly trip in 48 hours and westerly in 60 hours. The later and larger ships will require only 36 hours east and 48 hours west. Commander Burney is now in America conducting negotiations for the dirigible's builders. It has been proposed that if the remainder of the fleet, now built in the United States and half in England.

Officially Tested
 When completed the R-100 will be tested by the British Admiralty and given an air worthiness certificate. The U. S. has agreed to lend Lakehurst Airport Station for the mooring of the R-100 on her first trans-Atlantic flights.

Luxury marks the passenger equipment of the R-100. There is a combination dining saloon and lounge in which 50 persons can be served meals at one time. A staircase connects the ship's three floor levels with the control car, below.

Staterooms open off a hallway surrounding the dining saloon, and companion ways connect with the promenade decks.

Rich Carpets
 All furniture and fittings have been designed to provide luxurious comfort with minimum weight. The ship's structural frame, of aluminum alloy, is covered in the lounge with upholstered veneer. The floor is of five-ply veneer, richly carpeted.

There are two promenade decks. One on each side of the ship. They permit lounging, deck games, and dancing. There are bungee facilities also on the upper communication decks. Observation windows are built into the hull. The wall structure is two layers of specially made fireproof fabric, providing sound-proof stateroom partitions.

Speculators for Advance
Regain Control—Sales
About Three Million

NEW YORK, Apr. 3 (AP)—Speculators for the advance regained control of the price movement today after an early period of irregularity. Early gains in the recent industrial favorites ran from 2 to 20 points with a 20 point jump in Wright Aeronautical as the big feature. Trading in the annual dividend on Atchafalpa from \$7 to \$10 stimulated activity in the railroad group, which joined the upward procession in the early afternoon. Trading, which had slowed up during the morning, picked up on the afternoon recovery.

Atchafalpa and Pittsburgh and West Virginia led the advance in the railroad group by climbing 4 and 5 1/2 points, respectively. New York Central moved up 3 points and St. Louis and San Francisco, Nickel Plate and Western Maryland moved up 2 points or more.

The sensational advance in Wright was attributed in some quarters to the urgent retreat of a trapped short interest and in others to open market buying for control. Eastman Kodak, Radio and Ross Insurance jumped 9 to 10 points and International Business Machine, Montana Power, Houston Oil, Fox Film A and C and C. I. to 5 points higher.

The closing was strong. Wright Aeronautical, after reaching \$120, took a tailspin to \$110.50, where it struck a favorable current of buying orders and climbed again to \$128. The market generally was stimulated by a burst of active buying of copper shares, lifting American Smelting, Calumet and Arizona and Greene Cananea 3 to 5 points. Heading sold around 111 while Texas and Pacific and Pittsburgh and West Virginia gained 9 and 9 1/2 points, respectively. Total sales approximated 3,000,000 shares.
