SACRAMENTO LIKES SPLIT SCHEDULE

Earl Sheeley, Ex-White Sox First Sacker, Expected to Help Team

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Apr. 4 (NBA Special)—The Senators may not have the balance of power in the coast league this year—but they do have balance. And it is upon a well balanced club that Manager Buddy Ryan and Owner Lew Morison pin hopes of at least winning a pennant.

"This split season helps us more than any other club," Ryan declared. "We always get off to a flying start, burn up the league for the opening weeks—and then injuries begin to hit us, and we slow up. We need to be sprinters, not runners. This split season gives us a better break."

There has been little change in the club since last season, but the one change is important. This is the presence of Earl Sheeley, former White Sox first baseman. He is expected to hit about .320 against coast league pitching, and a good first baseman has been Sacramento's one weak link for two years.

A staff of seasoned pitchers, not sensational but wise, will be offered. The only new comer is Tom Flynn, a rookie southpaw sensation, who may be carried or farmed out for experience. Lefty Vinc, a good young prospect, seems to have control this year, and the Canfield brothers, Carroll and Bill, will be carried all season if they show the stuff expected.

Max Richter, Buddy Kallio, John Singleton and Ray Keating are a quartet of veterans of many leagues who, with Dave Keet and "Speed" Shea, Sacramento, development of other seasons, round out the staff.

In Hank Severid, ex-American league star, and the veteran Art Koecher, Sacramento boasts a capable catching team. Champ Alway and Harris are fighting for the third string spot.

In addition to Sheeley at first, Ryan has Johnny Monroe and Leonard Barker as second basemen, Ray French as shortstop and Johnny McLaughlin at third. Monroe looked like major league material last season until injury slowed him temporarily.

Charnon Hoffman, Frank Osborn, Ray Hawker and Merlyn Kopp from the outfield combination—all good hitters.

Five regulars clubbed past 200 that season, and Sheeley is counted to further boost the hitting.

If a balanced club means anything, Sacramento has a real chance to figure this year.
