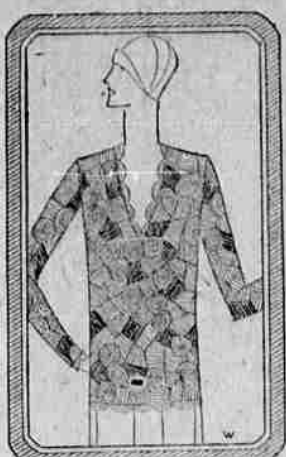

MENUS

BREAKFAST Stewed dried apricots, boiled rice with cream, ham toast, crisp graham toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON Macaroni baked with mushrooms, entire baked, floating island, milk tea.

DINNER Broiled sirloin steak, mashed potatoes, creamed cauliflower, cheese ball salad, peach up-side-down cake, milk, coffee.

This is the time of year when "old" potatoes are apt to be bit difficult. Before paring them let stand in cold water to more than cover for an hour or longer. Pare and drop at once into plenty of cold water. Let stand fifteen minutes if convenient and put on to cook in cold water. Use only enough water to cook tender and watch closely to prevent sticking and burning when done. Shake over the fire until perfectly dry, then mash and season.

Macaroni Baked with Mushrooms Two cups cooked macaroni, 1/2 pound mushrooms, 1 fresh tomato, 1 green pepper, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/4 teaspoon mustard, 3 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup top milk, 4 tablespoons buttered crumbs.

Line a baking dish with macaroni, pushing it up at the sides of dish. Fill with mushrooms peeled and cut in quarters. Cover mushrooms with tomato peeled and cut in slices and rings of green pepper. Mix salt, pepper and mustard and sprinkle over mixture. Dot with butter and pour over cream. Bake thirty minutes in a moderately hot oven. Just before serving sprinkle with buttered crumbs and return to oven long enough to brown the top. Serve from baking dish.

THE GARDEN

BET TOPS FOR GREENS The beet is the most economical of vegetables because you eat it all but the skin, and that is very thin and comes off readily. It is one of the very early garden vegetables that anyone can raise without trouble. It is useless to try to sow beets thinly because the so-called seeds are really collections of seeds in a single husk and they will come up in bunches.

They need not be thinned until the foliage has attained sufficient size to be pulled for greens. Plants should be left standing inches apart in the row to develop roots for baby beets which are cooked with the leaves and make a delicious dish. Every other plant should be pulled for baby beets, leaving plants standing six inches apart to grow into mature beet roots for buttered beets and pickled beets. The beet has become so highly esteemed as a staple in the diet that it is grown in cold frames for market so we have fresh beets the year around. Tread the soil very firmly upon the seed after it is planted. This speeds germination. The seed may go into the ground as soon as it can be worked after the frost is out. They may be sown

for a continuous supply of greens and roots from April to August 1.

The roots are most palatable when about two inches in diameter. The larger roots sometimes have an earthy taste. To avoid this fault only seed of the most highly developed types should be planted and it should be bought only from seed houses of good reputation which handle the higher quality selected stock.

Crosby's Egyptian is a standard variety and there are selected and improved strains of this old favorite. Detroit Dark Red is another standard sort of excellent quality. There are strains of ornamental leaved beets showing as brilliant colors as any foliage plants that are used for flower garden decoration.

PRINCE'S THUMB HURT LONDON, Apr. 4 (AP)—The Prince of Wales appeared at a "sing song" in the People's palace in the east end of London with his right thumb bandaged last night.

The thumb was injured in one of his recent falls from his horse, two of which he suffered on Monday in the Welsh guards challenge cup steeplechase.

LONDON, Apr. 4 (AP)—Dr. Abraham Rosenbach, of Philadelphia, paid 10,500 pounds (\$152,500) at auction today for the Ward Diary, dated 1623 to 1681. The diary was kept by the vicar of Stratford-on-Avon and is valuable for its references to Shakespeare.

Deny Rumors Of Attempt To Kill Leon Trotsky

MOSCOW, Apr. 4. (AP)—The soviet foreign office declared today that the report of the shooting of Leon Trotsky was "the purest fiction."

PARIS, Apr. 4. (AP)—A Havas dispatch from Moscow, says that the soviet authorities have officially denied rumors that Leon Trotsky, deposed soviet leader has been assassinated.

The dispatch quotes the announcement as saying: "Rumors that Trotsky has been assassinated are a malevolent invention." The story of the alleged assassination of the former red army commander, as printed in a Paris newspaper, says that he was shot in the back by an Armenian supporter of Joseph Stalin four days ago in a remote section of Turkestan. Trotsky's condition was stated to be desperate.

The story could not be confirmed from any other source and the paper headed it "Unauthenticated."

U.S. UNABLE TO WATCH POLLS IN CHICAGO, ILL.

WASHINGTON, Apr. 4. (AP)—Attorney General Sargent today refused to authorize the appointment of special federal deputies to maintain order at the polls in Chicago during the approaching primary election.

The attorney general held that he was not authorized by law to sanction the use of federal agents at such elections. His decision was made known in a telegram sent to Armour C. Anderson, United States marshal at Chicago. The message said: "In response to your request for authority to appoint special deputy marshals in connection with the

coming primary election I find no ground for altering the decision made two years ago upon a similar request from you that there is no warrant of law for such authority and therefore I cannot grant your request."
