Spring Football Begins Again At The University

Eugene, Apr. 5 (Special).—After a three-week lay-off for examinations and spring vacation, spring football practice at the University of Oregon was resumed this week with the first scrimmage drill scheduled for Friday.

Norman Jesse, 200-pounder, who hails from La Grande, probably will be one of the regular guards next fall. Jesse has had little football experience but he is big and fast and is a potential star.

Five lettermen will be lost to the 1928 team—Captain Beryl Hodgen and John Warren, guard; Homer Dixon, tackle; and Vic Wetzel and Frank Biers, ends. Ted Pope and Tony Greer, ends, and Charles Williams, half are eligible but are not in school this semester, while George Stadelman, star center, is out for the track team, and will not rejoin his football mates until next fall.

The following 1927 regulars are reporting for practice: Merrill Hagan and George McCutchan, guards; Tom Weema and Scott Warren, tackles; Harry Wood and LaSalle Coles, ends; Ira Woodie, quarter; George Burnell, Dave Mason, Hobie Robinson and Arthur "Whippet" Ord, halves, and Cottle Gould, full.

Captain John J. McEwan, head coach, said that Oregon's showing next fall will depend almost entirely on the ability of the big men from the freshman team to stand the gaff in faster company.

TED DEFEATS KAUFFMAN IN THIRD TANGLE

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 5 (AP).—Ted Thye, Portland made it three straight wins over Clete Kauffman, Columbus, Ohio, in their light heavyweight wrestling tangle here last night. After 27 minutes 7 seconds of fast work, featured by much roughness, Kauffman secured a body scissors on Thye. He was behind Thye at the time and when he straddled Thye's back the latter reared over backwards.

Kauffman landed on the bottom. The force of the fall with Thye's added weight, stretched Kauffman, cold. He was carried from the ring and after an extra five-minute allowance came back groggy. Thye made short work of him. The match was featured by Thye's flying wristlock and Kauffman's body and leg holds. In the 20 minutes preliminary Ted Brown and Ray Lyness went to a draw, each taking a fall.

Arne Souminen Is Holding His Lead

VEGA, Tex., Apr. 5 (AP).—A 25-mile hunt to Amarillo today confronted the 91 runners and walkers remaining in the Los Angeles to New York marathon.

With 1,152 miles covered, Arne Souminen of Detroit, continues to lead in elapsed time. His mark of 18:45:10 was more than five hours better than that of Andrew Payne, Claremore, Okla., who has held second place for some time.

Altitude Likely To Handicap Net Stars in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, April 5 (AP).—One of the biggest obstacles to the success of the United States Davis cup tennis team in its matches with the Mexican team here April 6, 7 and 8 is expected to be the lofty altitude.

Mexico City is located on a plain 7,350 feet above the sea and is about a mile and a third higher than Augusta, Ga., where the American players under William T. Tilden have been training.

The sudden change to this extreme altitude often causes the newcomer extreme discomfort which is especially marked in the cases of athletes. Bleeding from the nose sometimes occurs when persons newly arrived engage in strenuous exercise. It is also recorded that a diplomat from a foreign country once gave up his post here because he could not stand the elevation.

Just how great will be the effects of the rarefied air upon the Americans is problematical, but it is considered certain to have some influence upon their play. None of the visiting players has had a chance previously to become accustomed to the conditions under which they must play and they have only a short time before the August 1, 1928, where the training matches were held, has an elevation of but 134 feet while German-town, Pa., where the last Davis cup matches of last year were played is but 400 feet above the sea. The rise of 7,000 feet to Mexico City while more gradual, is comparable in its effect on the human system to an airplane ascent to a height of a mile.

Some was pointed out that the elevation probably will be felt the most by Big Bill Tilden as the full captain of the American team himself as an altitude of 6 feet above sea level. By the same method of figuring, it would have least effect on "Junior" Coen, the little Kansas City youngster of 16.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 5 (AP).—Opening the 1928 intercollegiate rowing season, California and Washington meet here April 6 to match strokes for coast supremacy. In the background, Poughkeepsie and Olympia clubs competition looms.

This year's dual race will round out a quarter of a century of lively rivalry between the two universities and the meeting brings together opposing crews evenly balanced as to weight, size and experience. California averages 175½ pounds to the man; Washington 175. The southerners average 6 feet in height; the northern oarsmen, 6 feet, 2½ inches. The majority in both shells have had varsity experience.

Beaten by two boat lengths on the Oakland estuary last year, Washington carried the sting of it east and in the Poughkeepsie regatta left California far behind to finish second in Columbia. The Washington Huskies have won 16 times and lost six to the Golden Bears. On three occasions since 1923 the dual event was not held. Three times Washington has won; at Poughkeepsie whereas California has yet to win the big contest of the east.

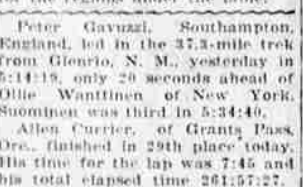
