Plan To Beautify Wallowa Cemetery

WALLOWA, Ore., Apr. 6 (Special)—A meeting of the Wallowa Cemetery association was held here Friday evening, with a large attendance of members and other interested persons. The purpose of the meeting was to formulate plans, and devise ways of improving and beautifying the cemetery grounds, through proper landscaping.

During the past year some very noticeable work has been accomplished toward a thorough cleaning of the grounds of dead grass, weeds and other refuse which has collected during the past number of years, when no improvement work to speak of has been done at the grounds. However, lack of sufficient money made it impossible to accomplish all that was desired along these lines. If ways can be worked out this year, those in charge of the work contemplate the continuance of clean-up work, to-

gether with the planting of shade trees of various species along the central driveway and around the outside of the grounds. In an effort to make this part of the work as extensive as possible, lot owners are being asked for small contributions which will take care of the price of one or more of these trees.
