CONTRACT BRIDGE Today's subject will be jumping of the partner's Minor Suit bids.

When Contract was first played in this country, there were many who made it an invariable convention to take out an initial Minor one-bid made by partner.

This obligatory take-out usually was a feature of some slam probing scheme, and slam-bidding was at first considered by many theorists to be an important factor in Contract.

When the declaring side has a score, a Minor should be treated in the bidding in exactly the same way that a Major would be at a love score.
