COUNTY LIBRARY IS URGED; BOOK FUNDS ARE APPORTIONED

County superintendent of schools E. A. Sayre has recently completed the library apportionment for the schools of Union county and the list of the schools together with the number of children enrolled as pupils and the amount each school is to receive for books for their respective libraries, is given herewith.

According to law, the county court of each county is obliged to include in the annual budget an amount equal to 10 cents for each school pupil, that amount being the minimum. Many counties levy a larger sum, but in this county the 10 cent figure has been adopted for a number of years.

To each school in the county has been mailed a blank on which is to be written the names of the books for which the money is to be expended. These lists must be returned to the superintendent's office in time for him to send the completed list on to the Oregon State Library by the first of May.

Another item, pointed out by Mr. Sayre and others, is the fact that in the smaller schools where the books might be used just as advantageously and where only a book or two can be purchased with the allotment for one year, there is little or no incentive to maintain a school library.

Supporters of the county library plan emphasize the fact that if the total sum, which is divided up into bits as shown below, were turned into a fund for a county library, which could be drawn upon by all the schools of the county, it would be a comparatively short time until a library adequate for the needs of the children of the entire county, could be accumulated.

Wallows Ship 1148 Carloads To Outside Markets

Recent reports completed by County Agriculturist Donaldson of Wallowa county give some interesting information concerning products marketed by rail from that county during the year 1927.

During that twelve-month period, 1148 carloads of products left that county for the markets of the world. This total was divided as follows: Wheat 369 cars, and amounting to almost half a million bushels; barley 14 cars; hay 3; wool 15; cattle 246; hogs 143; sheep 318; mixed 19 and horses 21.

As number of cars were concerned, 570 carloads of products having gone from the county seat town. Of these 154 were of wheat, 8 of barley, 13 of wool, 137 of cattle, 74 of hogs, 156 of sheep, 18, mixed and 11 cars of horses.

carloads came third and these were divided thus, wheat, 39; barley, 1; cattle, 47; hogs, 14; sheep, 192; horses, 6. Lostine sent out 114 cars of products—77 of wheat, 1 of wool, 4 of cattle, 21 of hogs, 10 of sheep and 1 of mixed.
