

Far Away Lands Greet New Ford With 'Open Arms'

From Alexandria to Moscow, from Mexico City to Santiago, from Cork to Yokohama, the appearance of the Model A Ford car has been a signal for enthusiastic ac-

claim unparalleled on any similar occasion in the history of the automobile, according to word received by W. C. Perkins, local dealer.

More than 100,000 people greeted the new car at Amsterdam, Holland, and showings in Rotterdam and The Hague added 140,000 more to the total. Approximately 140,000 people attended the showings at Manchester and London, England. In Madrid the attendance mounted to more than 150,000. Exhibitions in Antwerp,

Brussels and Zurich (Switzerland) drew a total of more than 100,000. The German showings attracted no less than 175,000. Approximately 100,000 people viewed the car at Santiago de Chile. At Buenos Aires the total was similarly high. At Paris 30,000 people saw the new car during the first six hours on opening day. The first day's attendance at Rio de Janeiro was 18,000; at Stockholm 11,000. In Montevideo (Uruguay), 35,000 people visited the car in three

days. In Tokyo, 50,000 people saw the new car. A private showing for the benefit of the royal family was held in Madrid. In Havana, where 22,000 persons viewed the new car, a private pre-showing was enjoyed by 1,200 public officials and persons of prominence. The crown prince of Sweden and other members of the royal family were among the first day's visitors to the exhibit at Stockholm. At Tokyo the brother of the emperor and three other imperial princes viewed the showing and drove the car, much to the delight of the onlookers.

Though only a few dealers in Finland possessed cars for exhibit, 20,000 people visited the showrooms of Finnish dealers on the day of the first showing in Helsinki. In Cuba, hundreds of people visited the showrooms of dealers, though cars were on display only at the Havana showrooms.

Other cities not heretofore mentioned, where the Model A was displayed are Osaka (Japan); Milan and Trieste (Italy); Alexandria and Cairo (Egypt); Athens and Salonika (Greece); Glasgow and Belfast (Ireland); Sao Paulo and Pernambuco (Brazil).

New \$3,000,000 Oakland Plant Opened April 2

PONTIAC, Mich., Apr. 7.—The new \$3,000,000 car assembly plant for the Oakland all-American six started production on April 2. It is announced by A. H. Grier, president and general manager of the Oakland Motor Car company.

The old assembly building was closed on March 24 to permit the transfer of a portion of the machinery to the new structure. A large proportion of the new plant equipment, however, is entirely new. Electrically-driven machine units with individual control are used throughout. The old building will be used for material storage.

With the completion of the new assembly building for the Oakland all-American six, the company now has one of the most modern automobile factories in the world. Two model assembly plants, one devoted exclusively to Oakland six production and the other to Pontiac production, now lie parallel to each other. They are served by an "indoor railroad yard," nine of the ten tracks being under roof. Construction throughout both plants is of brick, steel and concrete and the monolithic-type roofs admit a maximum of daylight. A huge addition to the Oakland-Pontiac shipping building was erected at the same time the new assembly plant was being constructed.

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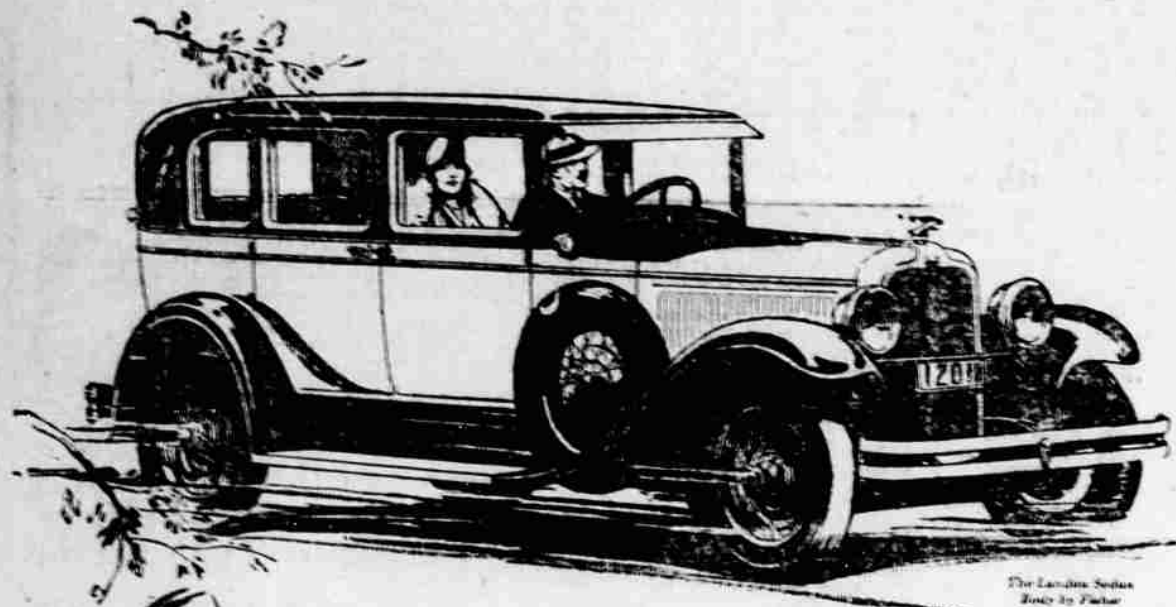
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
