"Rose of The Tenements" Showing Sunday

Bringing back memories of America's entrance into the World War, "Rose of the Tenements" is an absorbingly powerful and dramatic study of patriotism amid the gangsters of New York's East Side. The picture, which is coming to the Colonial theater tomorrow, deals with the influence of Bolshevik propaganda on the two leading characters, orphans who have been brought up to believe they are brother and sister, and the stirring events when war is declared. Directed by Phil Rosen, who made "The Life of Abraham Lincoln," and starring Shirley Mason in the title role, the film is one of the most striking and forceful screen dramas produced in many months. Johnny Harrison ably supports Miss Mason's superb work, and the remainder of the cast, which includes such names as Evelyn Selbie, Sidney Franklin, James Gordon, Frank McEvoy, J. Scott McKee, Jesse Deversia, Mathilde Comont, Valentina Zandina and Kalla Pasha furnish excellent characterizations. The picture was adapted from John A. Morrison's famous novel, "The Stumbling Block" by J. G. Griffith, who in his portrayal of the leader of the outlaw element of the town of Hambone, vies with him for the favor of the heroine and in turn tries to take advantage of her innocence in financial affairs.

Succeeding in antagonizing the heroine against the star, Neil is in a far way of winning all when he overpowers his hand and Custer rides pell-mell into the breach. The closing sequences of the picture are packed with wholesome action and drama as well as romance.

In addition to the feature "Bulldog Blues," another feature picture, "Fighting the Peas" will be shown on the same program, providing a big double showing for Saturday night at the Colonial.

Spring Styles Seen In Film At The Star

Tips on spring styles will be seen with the coming of Norma Shearer's new motion picture, "The Latest from Paris," her latest starring vehicle for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, which will be shown on the screen at the Star theater at Sunday and Monday.

In her newest screen production Miss Shearer portrays the role of a traveling saleswoman for a firm of New York wholesalers of suits, coats and gowns.

In order to have correct spring styles, advanced models of which have not yet been released to the public, the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio made arrangements with makers of women's wear to furnish the studio with a large variety of designs included in their list of spring modes.

The result was that Miss Shearer had them in her picture long before they had been made up in New York, and turned over to the wholesalers to be released for the spring trade. The models cover practically all types of gowns, as well as new styles in tailored effects.

In "The Latest from Paris" Ralph Forbes will be seen in the leading male romantic role.

Bert Roach will be seen as the inebricated drummer who supplies much of the comedy of Miss Shearer's new production. George Sidney and Tenen Holtz are seen as the clothing wholesalers and are as funny as Potash and Perlmutter ever dared to be. The story and screen play were written by A. P. Younger and the picture directed by Sam Wood.

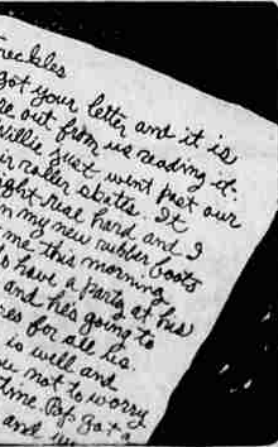

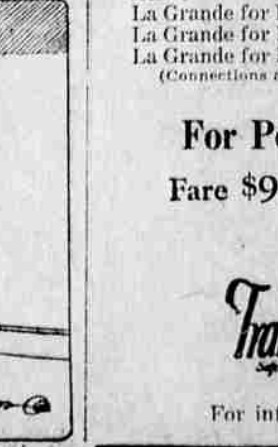

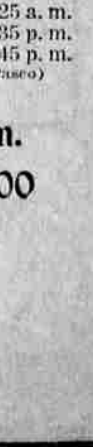
