MENUS

BREAKFAST—Macedoine of fruit, cereal, cream, poached eggs on spinach on toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Cauliflower baked with cheese, brown bread, tapioca prune pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Lamb stew with dumplings, grapefruit and cabbage salad, apple-poly, milk, coffee.

Carrots, turnips and onions are included in the stew making extra vegetables unnecessary in the dinner menu.

Tapioca prune pudding is an excellent dessert for children and old people while "grown-ups" will find it tasty and quite to their liking, too.

Tapioca Prune Pudding

One and one-half cups milk, 2 tablespoons quick cooking tapioca, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon butter, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup stewed and stoned prunes.

Heat milk in double boiler and slowly add tapioca, stirring constantly. Add salt and cook fifteen minutes, stirring frequently. Remove from fire and add sugar, butter and well-beaten yolks of eggs. Beat well and turn into a well-buttered baking dish. Bake thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Beat whites of eggs until stiff, beating in 3 tablespoons powdered sugar and 1/4 teaspoon with milk. Cover top of tapioca with an even layer of prunes. Pile beaten egg whites over prunes and return to a slow oven for ten minutes. Serve warm or cold.

THE GARDEN

MAKING WAR ON THE BUGS

Pea-planting time is also the time to start the annual bug hunt. Garden plants are subject to attacks by a variety of insects and the peas are one of the first to attract unwelcome visitors in the shape of plant lice or aphids. Following this early visitation are all manner of biting, stinging, chewing and sucking insects that also have if not promptly checked.

When the peas are planted the current bushes should have a drenching with a nicotine solution, either a patent solution or a home-made tea concocted by stewing tobacco stems, or smoking tobacco. The current bush is a harbor for plant lice and from the bushes they soon make their way to the peas.

Nicotine is the enemy of sucking insects. It kills them by contact and is the remedy for the various hordes of plant lice which come in assorted colors and in such numbers that often they cover the plant. They can be suppressed easily by energetic applications of tobacco. Tobacco dust sprayed upon them with a bellows is also an excellent means of destroying them.

For caterpillars and beetles of various kinds that bite and chew, arsenic is the controlling remedy in the form of arsenate of lead, paris green or other compound. Patent combinations of both arsenic and tobacco are sold at seed dealers. Arsenic should be ready for the first appearance of these pests.

A good spray should be available, either a bucket spray which is handiest for any considerable quantity of vegetables, or some of the various knapsack devices. For small gardens, sprays employing a Mason fruit jar as container are sufficient. The early attack on the bugs will make their suppression during the season an easy matter. Once they get well over the garden the task is more difficult.

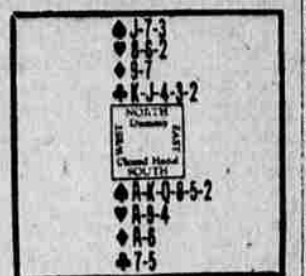

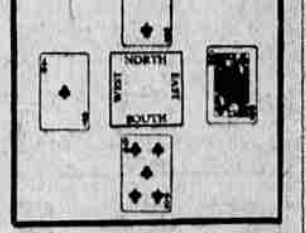
Bridge Pointers

This week we shall vary somewhat our method of presenting Declarer's problems and will give the complete play of the first trick; how should the Declarer plan to play the following hand with Spades the contract?



The play to the first trick was:

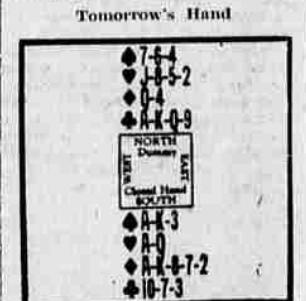


To trick 2, West leads the Ten of Clubs.

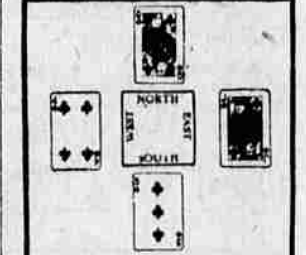
Declarer's Plan of Campaign

Declarer has lost one trick and if East have a Spade, must lose the second whether he plays a high Club from Dummy or a low one. East's play of the Queen of one Club shows that he has no more Clubs and, unless West holds all four of the adverse trumps, which is not probable, East would trump this trick if Declarer should play an honor from Dummy. As Declarer has a total of nine trumps including the four tops, forcing a trump from the East hand would not gain anything. Declarer has three losing cards—two Hearts and one Diamond—in his Closed Hand; being sure to lose the first two tricks, he cannot make game unless he can discard two of these sure losers. He will be able to discard only one of them if he plays a high Club on the second trick; but if he plays a low Club and permits the Ten to win, he will be able to get two discards and so game.

Should West lead a third Club, Dummy would again play small, closed Hand would trump, the adverse trumps would be put in with the Jack of trumps to lead the King and Jack of Clubs on which Declarer would obtain his two discards. If West led either Hearts or Diamonds, Declarer's play would be even more simple.

BRITISH SHIP OVERDUE
