Supreme Court Gives Decisions On Three Cases

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9 (AP)—Federal prohibition officers must report to United States attorneys alleged violations of the national prohibition law coming to their knowledge for the prosecution of the accused, it was held today by the supreme court.

The gift tax of the 1924 revenue act was declared void and unconstitutional by the supreme court today as applied to gifts made in 1924 prior to its enactment of June 2 of that year. The case arose out of \$100,000 in gifts made by Isaac C. Rosenberg, a brother of Samuel Untermyer, of New York City.

The supreme court ruled today that states are permitted to impose taxes on oil produced under leases on land purchased by Indians and not a part of their original allotment in the absence of action by congress to the contrary.

The case was argued by the state auditor of Oklahoma to enforce a \$20,000 tax imposed on the Gibson-Zahner oil corporation and others.

Sheriff Dumps 631 Gallons Into River

TOLEDO, Ore., Apr. 9 (AP)—Sheriff Horsfall, disclosed today that he had dumped 631 gallons of bonded whiskey in the Siletz river Sunday because he feared that his lackey was planning a raid to seize the liquor which he had been holding since August, 1925, when it was seized at White Cove. The sheriff said he had endeavored to get federal prohibition agents to remove the liquor to Portland for safe keeping, but that the government refused to move it. Last week he received a tip that a gang of Portland hi-jackers was planning to seize the liquor, which was valued at \$15,000 and he decided to dump it.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Dawn of Easter in Southern California was celebrated outdoors early Sunday by nearly 150,000 persons assembled at sunrise services on mountain tops, in verdant valleys, at seaside shrines and atop the grim sand dunes of her deserts.

Multitudes of voices welled upward in religious song and fervent prayer, to the dawn-streaked blue overhead, as the sun's glory burst over the darkly shadowed mountains, illuminating the scene with the light of Christ's rising.

The tiered seats of Los Angeles coliseum bowl were filled with southern California's largest gathering of Easter sunrise worshippers. More than 10,000 persons passed within its lighted gates while the darkness of night still shrouded the huge oval.

SACKETT NOT APPLICANT

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 9 (AP)—Governor Peterson said today that Sheldon P. Sackett, McMinnville newspaper publisher, is not an applicant for appointment as the governor's private secretary.

Sackett's name has been mentioned frequently in a speculative way. He was in conference with the governor today, and his frequent appearance at the capitol in recent months has given foundation to the report that he was a candidate.

MMAHAN WILL TRY FOR HIGH COURT CHAIR

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 9 (AP)—Judge L. H. McMahan, of the circuit court for Marion and Linn counties, today formally entered the contest for a seat on the state supreme court when he filed with the secretary of state his candidacy for the republican nomination.

The terms of Chief Justice Hand and Justice Rossmann expire this year. Hand's term expires in the regular way. Rossmann was appointed by Governor Patterson to succeed the late Chief Justice Burnett, and under the state law the appointment was only until his successor should be elected and qualified by the next general election. Both Hand and Rossmann are candidates to succeed themselves. For the two vacancies it is believed there will be only the three candidates.

McMahan was appointed circuit judge by Gov. Pierce to succeed the late Judge George G. Hingham. He was elected at the following general election in 1924 and his present term expires regularly in January, 1928.

Other candidates filing today included: C. D. Wallace, Baker, republican, for district attorney of Baker county.

Rangers Rescue Girls From Lip Of Huge Cliff

LINDSAY, Cal., Apr. 9 (AP)—Reached by forest rangers from a narrow ledge where darkness had trapped her during a trip to Yosemite valley, Miss Edna May Wilbur, daughter of Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur, was home here today none the worse for her thrilling experience.

Miss Wilbur went to the park with a party of friends. She and Miss Ora E. Ring attempted late Saturday to descend the snow-covered trail from Glacier Point to the floor of the valley. Caught by darkness, they lost the trail and presently found themselves on a narrow ledge, whence they feared to attempt further progress.

With a biting mountain wind tugging at their clothing, the girls huddled against the face of the cliff and called for help. Tourists in the valley 2,000 feet below heard their cries and notified the forest rangers.

Five men reached the girls shortly before midnight, and after strenuous efforts succeeded in hauling them up to the trail with ropes. Once back on the trail, they were guided down to safety and left for home after resting. Both girls are school teachers here.

Air Line to Have Radio Stations

WASHINGTON, Apr. 9 (AP)—The Federal Radio commission granted construction permits today to the Boeing Air Craft transport line, of Seattle, Wash., for radio stations at 19 landing fields in the states of California, Utah, Washington, Oregon, Nevada, Nebraska and Illinois.

The company plans to keep in direct contact with its passenger freight and mail carrying ships over the airways connected by the field and has a so called for license for transmitters for 25 planes.

Three wave lengths of 53.7, 71.8 and 131.8 meters length, and not exceeding 1000 watts power, will be utilized. Among the stations will be Sacramento, Oakland, Redding, Concordia, Los Angeles and Fresno, California; Seattle, Wash., and Portland and Medford, Ore.

World Mission Meeting Closes On Mount Olive

JERUSALEM, Apr. 9 (AP)—An international conference of missionaries, which concluded its work on Mt. Olive yesterday, adopted a resolution to meet often, and heard criticism that missionaries, preaching Christ's doctrine of peace, rely upon gunboats for protection when danger threatens their foreign lands.

The resolution expressed the conference that protection of missionaries should only be by such methods as are calculated to promote good will in personal and official relations. It urged all missionary societies to "make no claim on their government for armed missionaries or mission property."

German Plane May Start Tomorrow

BALDONNEL, Irish Free State, Apr. 9 (AP)—Captain Hermann Koell and Colonel James C. Fitzmaurice, co-pilots of the Bremen trans-Atlantic venture, today awaited the regular Atlantic weather report for tonight to determine whether they will hop off for the United States tomorrow.

Baron von Huenefeld, the German sponsor of the flight, impatient at the long delay which has held the Bremen at Baldonnel, is willing to start any time that his pilots will take the plane into the air.

Colder Weather Checks Easter Floods In East

NEW YORK, Apr. 9 (AP)—Cold weather today checked Easter floods in Northern New York, Vermont, New Hampshire and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

High temperatures, which had melted snow and started the leech down the rivers, and heavy rains over the week end had sent many streams out of their banks, disrupting rail traffic and communication systems.

Two men were killed when the raging Chaudiere river swept their wagon off a bridge near St. Lambert, Quebec, and two members of a Canadian National railway passenger train were believed drowned when the engine and baggage car of the train, en route to Montreal from Quebec dropped through a bridge at Drummondville, Quebec, in Vermont several temporary bridges erected last summer were carried away. The Passumpsic river washed out rails at Lyndonville, delaying the Montreal-Boston express on the Canadian Pacific railway fifteen hours.

Ice flows from Lake Erie were swept into the Niagara river near Buffalo endangering small craft and causing the water to back up. In the Lausie section of Niagara Falls the river was about two and one half feet above normal and below the falls it was nearly seven feet over.

Military Revolt Quickly Crushed

CARACAS, Venezuela, Apr. 9 (AP)—A military revolt occurred in the Venezuelan capital Sunday. It was speedily suppressed, but with some casualties. The mutineers planned to gain possession of San Carlo barracks to the north of the city, but when revolting forces, accompanied by some university students reached the barracks, they were received with a rifle volley several of them being killed.

INSANE MAN HELD

ROSEBURG, Ore., Apr. 9 (AP)—A man giving the name of Lawrence Kalipodis was arrested at Canyonville last night and is being held in the county jail. He is said to have escaped from the insane asylum at Tacoma, and officers from that city are reported to be on their way to Roseburg to take the man back to Washington. Kalipodis, according to Sheriff Webb, was driving a car said to have been stolen from Mrs. Emma Hubbard, of Tacoma.

STEALS FROM CHURCH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Apr. 9 (AP)—While hundreds knelt in prayer at the 10:30 a. m. Easter Sunday mass, a thief stealthily entered the sanctuary of the Sacred Heart Catholic church yesterday and stole approximately \$250 which had been offered by the congregation a few minutes before. No clue of the robber was left behind.

KLAN TESTIMONY HEARD

PITTSBURGH, Apr. 9 (AP)—Testimony that S. D. Hich grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in Pennsylvania several years ago, advocated that riots be staged in order to increase interest in the organization, was given in federal court here late today, during the trial of counter suits growing out of Klan activities in this state.
