Norma Shearer's New Picture At The Star

In "The Latest From Paris," Norma Shearer has given to picturegoers one of the best of her comedy-drama efforts.

The picture opened yesterday at the Star theater, where a big audience applauded its showing and gave every evidence of being captivated by Miss Shearer's clever portrayal of a unique screen role. It will be presented again tonight which will be the last showing here.

That Norma is no ordinary screen star is emphatically indicated by her choice of screen roles. She goes in for drama and situation comedy, regardless of backgrounds, warbles and close-ups which have done much to make good histrionic work fall flat in the hands of less capable stars than Miss Shearer.

In the opinion of this reviewer Norma does even better work than she did in "His Secretary" and "The Waning Sex," heretofore regarded as her two best pictures of the past several years.

The situations have been contrived with more cunning and the story, as a whole, is better than any she has had as a vehicle.

Direction Brilliant

Sam Wood has very capably directed the picture, just as he directed such Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer productions as "Rookies" and "The Fair Co-ed."

Ralph Forbes does excellent work both as a lover, a sick man and a rival salesman for a wholesale coat and suit firm. George Sidney remains the cleverest Jewish character actor of the screen, and is ably assisted by Tenor Hantz, who is somewhat new to the screen, but is rapidly winning laurels as a Hebrew character comedian.

Bert Roach, Margaret Landis, William Bakewell and other members of the past put everything they have into their efforts and thereby succeed in good portrayals.

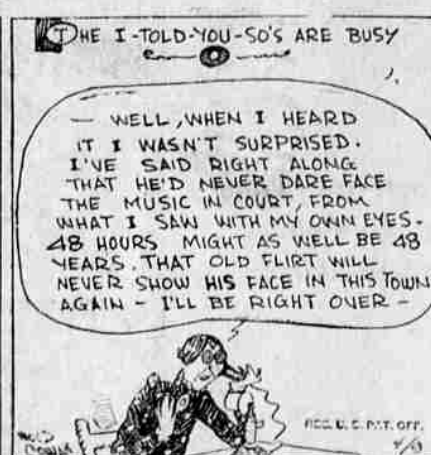
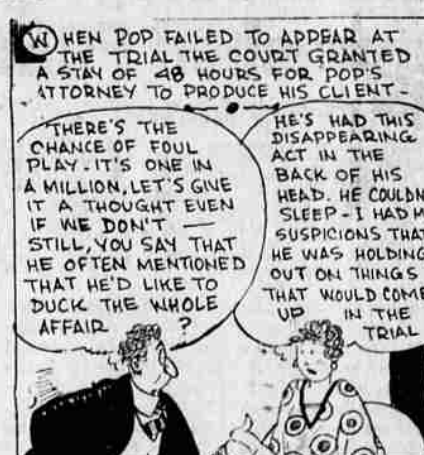
