La Grande High To Participate In State Meet

OREGON STATE COLLEGE

Corvallis, Apr. 10—Entries for the second annual Oregon state interscholastic track and field meet at Corvallis May 12 have now mounted to 23 high schools. These include Washington, Roosevelt, Benson, Lincoln, and Jefferson at Portland; Milwaukee, Grants Pass, Echo, West Linn, Culver, Astoria, Bend, Union, Eugene, Mill City, La Grande, Forest Grove, Heaverton, Madras, Silverton, North Bend, Seaside, and Marshfield.

Reports coming in from the different high school coaches throughout the state make mention of the keen interest being shown in interscholastic track this year. Although weather conditions have been somewhat against early season training the boys have been getting in plenty of work and some new records are expected at this year's meet.

Word has been received from some of the high school principals that their schools are unable to enter a team as they have no track available. Officials here want principals who are handicapped for lack of proper training facilities to keep in mind the different field events and long distance races where a cinder track would not be required to train on. A good jumper, weight man, or distance runner may be overlooked. Sponsors of the meet here want the turnout to be as representative of the state as possible.

All the events last year were closely contested and the men placing were from all corners of the state.

Last year La Grande was among the leading teams in the state track meet, finishing with 12 1/2 points and one first place, Shute winning the 440-yard dash.

Pendleton High Seniors Winners Of Class Event

PENDLETON, Ore., Apr. 10—The Pendleton high school senior class took the annual meet Saturday on the Round-Up grounds with 58 points, but had a real struggle with the Sophomores who finished second with 52 1-2 markers. The Juniors were a poor third with 32 and a half, and the Freshmen trailed as all freshmen should with 4 points.

CHEAP SEED TREATMENT

WASHINGTON (AP)—For five cents an acre, Dr. A. G. Johnson, federal cereal pathologist declares, farmers in the central portion of the corn belt can treat their seed corn with a chemical dust that will largely prevent losses caused by seed-borne seedling blight organisms and increase their yield from 1 to 12 bushels an acre.

CANADA BUYS U. S. COAL

Nearly 25% of Canada's coal is bought in the United States, according to records of the department of commerce for 1927. The Dominion imported 15,178,646 tons of bituminous coal, of which the United States furnished more than 12,000,000 tons, and 4,062,619 tons of anthracite, of which 2,942,575 tons came from this country.

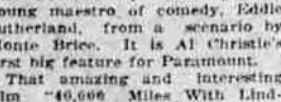
