FLOODS RECEDING IN EAST CANADA

Six Lives Lost and Much Property Damage Is Caused by Overflow

MONTREAL, Apr. 10 (AP)—Flood water, which had taken six lives and caused large property damage in the provinces of Quebec, Ontario and New Brunswick, were receding today as cold weather settled down, checking seasonal melting of ice and snow.

Some suburbs of Montreal were still under water, caused by a huge ice jam in the St. Lawrence river which caused it to back up and spread out over the lowlands, and conditions were improving.

A mother and her infant son were drowned in the swollen waters of a creek near North Bay, Ont., at the height of a blizzard as the husband rescued another son and vainly attempted to save them.

The bodies of both trainmen of the Canadian National Railway express which plunged through a flood-weakened bridge at Drummondville, Que., have been recovered.

Two other men were drowned when their wagon was swept off a bridge over the Chaudiere river near Lambert, Que.

Railway service was near normal again with large gangs of workmen replacing tracks swept away by the high waters. Several washouts occurred on the lines of the Canadian National railway in New Brunswick, but temporary tracks were expected to be laid before night fall.

Ballot Title Is Filed For Auto License Measure

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 10 (AP)—Secretary of State Koser has filed the ballot title for the revised Standard \$2 automobile license fee bill. The title prepared by Attorney General Van Winkle, reads as follows:

"To provide a \$2 annual license fee for motor vehicles of all kinds except trucks, trailers, semi-trailers and electric vehicles for commercial purposes for which classes such fees remain unchanged; also except passenger buses which it exempts from all license fees now paid except the present sales tax; also exempting motor vehicles not commonly used primarily for commercial purposes from additional license fees which they now pay; exempting for five years of all kinds from any and all license fees whatever and abolishing all fees based upon the weight of motor vehicles."

park at Enterprise, to a point 1000 feet below the salmon hatchery, and Kinney Lake, east of Joseph. With all other lakes and streams open to fishermen, there should be but little cause for confusion on the part of unacquainted sportsmen, about fishing in closed waters, it is said.

Commission Busy
It is predicted by those who know of the volume of work that has been done by the game commission in the matter of providing protection for the thousands of fish which have been planted in the lakes and streams through prohibiting angling in many of them for a few years, that sportsmen who have felt that the state game commission have been loafing on the job, are destined for some surprises with the opening of the fishing season this year. Under the system which has been in effect during the past years, it is said that fishing will no doubt be much better this season than for many years, and that anglers will have no difficulty in making their limit.

It catches of good sized trout. The many lakes in the mountains, a number of which can be reached without any great difficulty, may provide the best for the fishermen who desire real sport and fun with his outfit.

10 And 20 Inches Long

The large list of mountain lakes which are being opened for the first time this year include Kinney Lake, which is well stocked with Eastern Brook and Rainbow trout—the Rainbow of this lake have reached a length of 20 inches in some cases, while the Eastern Brook trout which were planted there two years ago are said to average about 10 inches.

This lake is reached via the South Fork. Several other lakes which are also reached by the South Fork route are, Laverly Lake, Hobo Lake, Lilly Lake and Maxwell Lake. These also have been plentifully stocked with Eastern Brook trout, and are opened to fishing this season for the first time, being located on the west side of the South Fork only about an hour's walk from the road. They will provide many with an opportunity of enjoying mountain lake fishing without the necessity of having to make longer and more difficult trips in to other parts of the mountains.

Wood Lake, the home of the game Steelhead trout, which have grown to a length of 16 inches should by all means be on the thrill hunter's list points to be visited, local men say. Mr. Rogers, game warden, who is acquainted with the tactics of these fish, voices a warning to those who contemplate casting there, to look well to their tackle, attempting to use nothing but the best. Wood Lake is also reached via the South Fork and is located one mile north of Kinney Lake. Lost Lake, which is reached by the East Fork of the Lostine river, may supply some fine fishing this season, being well stocked with Eastern Brook trout. This lake is about three miles above the end of the road.

Diamond Lake
Still another point which should prove popular with those who wish to combine their fishing trip with a few days outing and road fishing, which is not easily accessible to all, is Diamond Lake, located at the head of Elk creek and may be reached via the Mhmam river. Here the use of packhorses is advisable, and here again, Mr. Rogers reminds fishermen that the old lines which have been used for catching suckers along the river should have no place in the fishermen's tackle kit, as Diamond Lake has been planted with Cutthroat trout, which are likely to provide the sportsman with some excitement when connected with the hook. Guides and horses will be available at Wallawa lake, after June 1.

Re-opening of various streams, also will supply many miles of fishing in the county this year. Among these are Bear creek and tributary streams, which supply Rainbow trout. East Fork of Lostine River, where both Eastern Brook and Rainbow are found, as well as Hurricane creek and tributaries, another good Rainbow stream will also be available.

Photographer Beaten
A newspaper photographer, very indignant, said he had been beaten by two women election workers when he tried to take pictures. He added that a man came to the aid of the photographer and he succeeded in giving him a black eye.

From one precinct came a report that a policeman was making a general nuisance of himself and from another a note was sent to the election commissioners, in the county building by a judge who said the ballot box over which he presided was being stuffed but he was afraid to say anything about it.

Despite the reports of disturbances, mostly of a minor character, the election commissioners did not seem perturbed and stated there was no more disorder in the early balloting than in previous hotly contested elections. Besides 2000 police on active duty at the polls more than 550 detectives armed with rifles waited at the county building to speed to any part of the city where they were needed.

A telephone report from an excited woman reported trouble in a precinct on the South side and a squad of police was hurried there while from a precinct of the 24th came a report that the judges were busy marking ballots and placing them in the boxes themselves.

John Verdon, the Thompson-Crowe candidate for state representative was arrested on complaint of a Deneen watcher, who said he was beaten by Verdon who had questioned his credentials.

Found Asleep
One of the reported kidnappings fizzled out. Haffa, for whom his headquarters hunted all night in the belief he had been kidnapped, was found by a detective squad, asleep in a republican club in his ward.

Aristotle M. Collins, 47, a Lowden delegate candidate to the republican national convention from the eighth congressional district was reported kidnapped as he stepped from his home today by seven men, who faced him with pistols, forced him into an automobile and sped away.

Dam Breaks But River Takes Flood

WELLS RIVER, Vermont, Apr. 10 (AP)—A bursting dam at Gilman, 35 miles north of here, caused alarm early today but aside from a short lived rise in the already swollen waters of the Connecticut river, was not believed to have had serious consequences.

The dam, the property of the Gilman Paper company extended across the river between 200 and 300 feet and was about 50 feet high. Late yesterday afternoon the water had risen to a point nine feet above the top of the dam wall or two feet higher than during the disastrous floods of last November.
