Game Commission Holding Meeting In Ashland, Ore.

MEDFORD, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—The regular meeting of the game commission, which will attend in a body the annual meeting and banquet of the Jackson County Game Protective association, was held at Ashland this morning—the first gathering of the kind ever to be held in Southern Oregon. Governor I. L. Patterson will arrive this afternoon to attend the banquet tonight at which he will be a guest of honor.

At the morning session of the game commission the reports of the Oregon State college veterinarians and experts on the malady that is claiming many deer ranging in Douglas county was read and discussed. The report showed that the malady was due to six different internal afflictions, caused by parasites and that the infection was of long standing. The report stated that the epidemic was due to an exceptionally long wet season. It was reported that the game commission was distributing medicinal suits in Douglas county in an effort to halt the disease.

A resolution was adopted voting disapproval of the Norbeck bill, which places game reserves under federal control and voted to send Commissioner Clifford to the annual convention of the Isak Walton association to Omaha, Neb., May, where he will make a speech on the growth and propagation of Hungarian pheasants in this state.

FLIER'S BODY IS FOUND NEAR NORFOLK, VA.

NORFOLK, Va., Apr. 11 (AP)—The body of Commander T. G. Ellyson, a native of Richmond, Va., one of three naval aviators who disappeared with a seaplane after leaving Hampton Roads for Annapolis at 2 a. m. Feb. 24, was recovered this morning at Willoughby, a Norfolk suburb, where it was washed ashore.

Identified by a radiogram from his wife, found in one of his pockets, telling of the illness of their child. It was in response to this message that the flight from Norfolk to Annapolis was undertaken.

Charles D. Stuber, of Oceanview, who was walking along the beach shortly before daylight this morning, stumbled over the body and notified the police. Commander Ellyson's face had been badly crushed, presumably when the plane crashed. He wore an aviator's suit over civilian clothes.

BRIGHTER FUTURE SEEN FOR WOOL

Developments Point to a Better Market for Products, Growers Say

WASHINGTON (AP)—Three distinct circumstances are considered by specialists to present an opportunity for American wool growers to place their industry on the best financial basis in history. Immediate importance is attached to the continued rise in the farm price of wool, due to heavier domestic demands for the American product and a strengthened foreign market. Growers are expected to take advantage of the situation to improve their stock.

J. F. Walker, consulting specialist for the federal division of cooperative marketing, has just completed a world-wide study of the wool industry and announces there is little prospect for further expansion of production in the great wool regions of New Zealand, Australia and South Africa.

The third development is the apparent willingness of congress to turn over to the department of agriculture for educational purposes unallocated war-time excess wool profits which may reach several hundred thousand dollars.

Under the provisions of the Morgan bill, already passed by the house, these funds would be used in wool standardization work and in educating producers to the benefits of blooded stock. The author, Rep. William M. Morgan, republican, Ohio, would make not more than \$50,000 available each year. He stipulates that only such money as the government is unable to return to growers shall be used.

The funds, now held by the federal treasury, amount to approximately \$241,000. In urgent need of wool during the war, the government set up a scale of prices to be paid to the producer and fixed the profits of the dealers, announcing that all money collected above the stated profits would be attached to the government and pro rated back to the producers. There is still about \$600,000 that never was collected from certain large dealers who contested the government's right to take the surplus earnings, which now hinges on a United States supreme court decision as to the constitutionality of the arrangement.

Large amounts of the "excess profits" cannot be distributed because records of purchase are incomplete, producers to whom they belong cannot be found or some other circumstance has intervened. If the undistributed funds are made available to the department of agriculture as Representative Morgan suggests, they would be administered by G. T. Willingmire, assistant chief marketing specialist, of the federal division of wool marketing investigations and standardization. Willingmire considers the proposed educational campaign one of the foremost steps toward permanent retrenchment of the American wool industry.

It is explained that this country holds the only present opportunity for expansion of wool production because New Zealand, Australia and South America already are carrying more sheep than is conservatively estimated to be safe and have reached the saturation point because of limiting climatic and geographic factors.

Four Deer Slain By Giant Cougar

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Apr. 11 (AP)—Four deer were slain in one week by a huge cougar, which was killed yesterday by Harry Stokes, government hunter in this county. A farmer on the lower Rogue saw the cougar kill a deer last week. The big cat ran when he saw the men approaching but returned later and drained the carcass into some brush. He disappeared but the government hunter found his trail five days later and also saw where three more deer had been killed and partially eaten. Stokes' dogs freed the animal and it was killed and was found to be one of the largest cougars killed here in years.

Mr. Stokes also killed a cougar on the Illinois river last week.

EIGHT REBELS SLAIN

MEXICO CITY, Apr. 11 (AP)—Dispatches from Guadalajara today said eight insurgents including a chief, were killed and an army officer and one soldier wounded in three clashes at various points in the state of Jalisco.

SUSPECT MURDER

CISCO, Tex., Apr. 11 (AP)—The eight members of the R. N. Jackson family whose bodies were found in the charred remains of their little home near here Friday were murdered by a person or persons unknown, according to a coroner's verdict returned here today.

Counter Action Of Ousted Klan Members Denied

PITTSBURGH, Apr. 11 (AP)—A counter action of five ousted Ku Klux Klansmen seeking a receivership for the order in Pennsylvania was thrown out of federal court here this afternoon by Federal Judge W. H. S. Thompson.

Judge Thompson interrupted arguments to hand his opinion from the bench. He held the federal court was without jurisdiction and that the question of a receivership and accounting for money collected in Pennsylvania by the Klan was a matter for the state courts.

Charges that Imperial Wizard Irlan Evans, of the Ku Klux Klan used Klan money to foster murder, riots, arson, and other acts of violence, were made in court by Van A. Barlickman, attorney for five deposed members who seek a receivership for the order in Pennsylvania.

In a heated argument with Klan counsel, Barlickman, himself a defendant in a suit filed by the Klan said that Evans not only misused the funds of the order, but had boasted he was the order and that he would elect presidents, control congress, dominate the courts and overthrow state governments.

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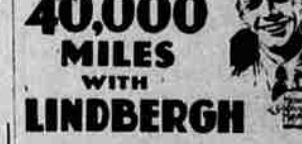
