

MAJOR LEAGUES GET UNDER WAY

**Yanks Win in American
—Giants Victors—Six
Homers Chalked Up**

Reset by weather more suitable for the gridiron than the diamond, fourteen teams yesterday began their annual bid for major league baseball honors. Washington and Boston had stolen a march by making their opening gestures penward on Tuesday.

Nearly 200,000 persons knocked off work to see the eight games. Wild and unsteady, Grove, the speed ball expert, lasted only three innings against the New York Yanks who moved down Connie Mack's Athletics at Philadelphia 8 to 3.

The Pittsburgh Pirates defending their national league crown, ran into an avalanche of hits at St. Louis and bowed to the Cardinals, 14 to 7.

Led by Andy Cohen, young Jewish star, John McGraw's New York Giants vanquished the Boston Braves at the Polo grounds, 5 to 2.

Jimmy Ring outpitched Jess Petty to give the Phillies a four to three decision over Brooklyn at Ebbets field.

Some run by Freddy Maguire, Chicago Cubs from a shutout at the hands of Cincinnati Reds at Cincinnati. The Reds hit Charlie Root opportunely to win, 5 to 1.

With George Uhle showing a return to form, the Cleveland Indians battered Ted Lyons and George Connally for 13 hits and beat the Chicago White Sox at Chicago, 4 to 2.

Forty thousand, the largest crowd of the day, saw the revamped St. Louis Browns defeat Detroit at Tigerland, four to one. At Boston, the Washington Senators avenged their first game defeat at the hands of the Red Sox by hammering out an 8 to 4 victory over Bill Carrigan's charges.

NEW YORK, Apr. 12 (AP)—The big league annual home run race is under way again with the four leading sluggers of a year ago left at the post.

Six circuit drives figured in the box scores of the eight games yesterday but none of them went to the credit of the two leading long distance sluggers in each league last year—Habe Ruth and Buster Gehrig in the American and Cy Williams and Hack Wilson in the National. Cy, however, can't be blamed for he did not get into the Phillies opening day lineup.

National league batsmen accounted for five of the half dozen home runs. These went to Frankie Frisch and Jim Bottomley of the St. Louis Cards, Freddy Maguire, Chicago Cubs' recruit infielder, Harvey Hendrick of the Brooklyn Robins and Bob Smith Boston Braves pitcher.

Ken Williams, saved the American league from complete humiliation by trotting all the way around the bases after getting hold of the "right" one, served up by Marberry of the Washington Senators.

NEW FILM INVENTION REMOVES FIRE HAZARD

LIVERPOOL, Eng., (AP)—An invention to eliminate heat from light, reducing the risk of fire, is being demonstrated here at the Alhambra cinema.

The invention, the work of Gordon Cameron and Charles McNair, consists of a colorless liquid compounded of various metallic salts which, when placed between a light and the object to be illuminated, filters the heat rays without noticeable diminution of the light rays.

MEDFORD, Ore., Apr. 15 (AP)—Sportsmen representing every section of the state attended the annual banquet of the Jackson County Game Protective association held at Ashland last night. Governor Patterson, State Treasurer Thomas B. Kay, Secretary of State Sam A. Koser, and members of the state game and fish commission were among the guests.

A resolution of the Oregon Game Protective association approved by the meeting opposes hydro electric dams on the Umpqua, Rogue, Deschutes and Me-

Kenzie rivers. Another resolution opposed the proposed establishment of game sanctuaries in national forests by federal bureau and the third adopted calls for a probe of salmon trolling off the Oregon coast.

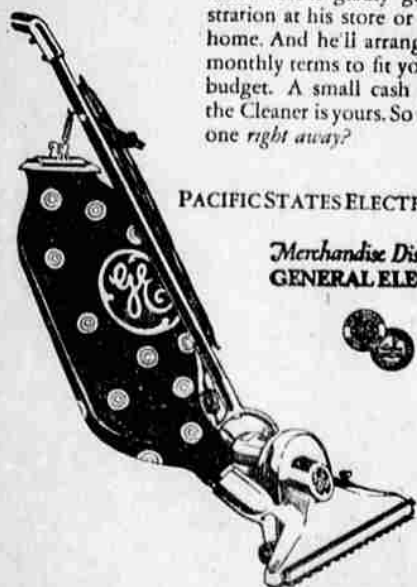
