"West Point" An Exciting Picture

West Point—the very name suggests romance, glorious traditions and patriotism. All these are echoed in William Haines' new Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer starring vehicle, in which, at the Arcade theater today, Friday and Saturday the audience follows his career as a cadet through the government's military academy.

It's a story of youth and romance with the thrill of a great football struggle, the spectacle of parades and evolutions of Uncle Sam's future officers—and a delicate romance between Haines and Joan Crawford running through it. Haines plays a "fresh" young man who comes to West Point to play football. The traditions of the corps mean nothing to him. He's conceited, selfish, wayward.

The remaking of the youth from this raw material into ideal timber for officership is strikingly shown in a dramatic and entertaining sequence. There are many comedy moments in his training—comedy moments of which Haines takes the fullest advantage; there are heart throbs as the cadet is put through the bitter experiences that must be his lot before he can learn the lesson of the corps; he has every sympathy with him even while realizing that it's all for his good. The love theme is wonderfully carried out by Haines and Joan Crawford, who play the heroine of the new story.

One of the outstanding characterizations is the work of William Bakewell as the timid young "Tex," adoring friend of the football hero, and Ralph Emerson and Nell Neely give clean-cut portrayals as student officers. Major Raymond G. Moses of the United States army, who plays the role he plays in real life as instructing officer at West Point, handles his part cleverly.

Colorful Life Of Navy Is Shown in Film

Fox Films' "Sharp Shooters" which is showing today and Friday at the Star theater is one of the most colorful pictures that film fans have seen in a long time. The cast is headed by two such able stars as George O'Brien and Lois Moran, who add new laurels to their already long list by their work in this picture.

This picture has as its ingredients every known element to please any fan, no matter how discriminating. Every scene is full of action. Irony, comedy, pathos and thrills are prevalent throughout the picture. J. G. Blystone has done an outstanding bit of direction.

quences have been obtained by cameraman Charles Clarke. The fact that George O'Brien served in the Pacific fleet during the World war makes his part in this picture all the more alluring, for in every sequence he is thoroughly at home.

THE HERITABLE CHILD

Irritability in children is often due to physical ill health, tonsillar infection, eye strain and quite frequently an unsuitable diet—any physical condition producing continuous if only moderate discomfort. Every child presenting the problem of irritability should first of all have the most thorough physical examination.

The investigation stopping here, however, is only half complete, for mental situations are at least as likely to produce irritability. If a young man is bad-tempered, would you stop after asking if he has a cavity in his tooth or would you be interested in the atmosphere of his home and work place? The same applies to the child, but it is surprising how many parents refuse to take any interest in an attempt to study this phase. The explanation may be based in temperament and a given child may be more affected than another exposed to the same conditions because he has inherited a fault of temperament from his parent. In addition he is always under the charge of that parent, and there is nothing more irritating than such a superior. So the irritation grows like the proverbial snowball on the hill. When the problem comes up and the parents are put under question, mother usually accuses father, and father drops into the office next day to tell the doctor who the real offender is. Sometimes both parents unite to tongue-lash the child's teacher. When irritability is in question, father and mother need to be almost superhumanly honest and self-analytical.

The psychological cause of irritability is as varied as the physical and could not be covered short of writing a fairly thick book, but those most commonly mentioned can be mentioned. Napping is probably the most frequent. If a child is trained from the first to obey with reasonable promptness, napping will not be necessary a few years later. Some psychologists have condemned saying "don't" to the child to an extravagant degree, losing sight of the fact that all civilization and law are one big "don't".

No doubt some children hear too many "don't's". Their irritating effects can be diluted with an occasional "do." Before answering stop to consider how harmful consent may really be and as often as possible let some pleasure originate from you. The father who occasionally offers to take the boys to

A ball game and the mother who organizes a picnic will meet with much less resistance to legitimate "don't's." Explanation may take the sting out of a refusal, but it is not practical to stop and explain every prohibition. Many cannot be explained to infantile minds, for instance, why a boy should not pour glue into the gasoline tank.

One other source of irritability often uncovered is unsuitable placement in school. The child may be incapable of meeting the demands of his grade or, less often, may be so far ahead of it as to feel restrained. A psychometric test will settle this situation quickly and accurately.

If physical sources of discomfort are removed and mental conflicts not neglected, irritability should be controlled with reasonable ease.

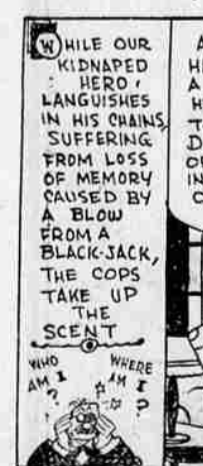

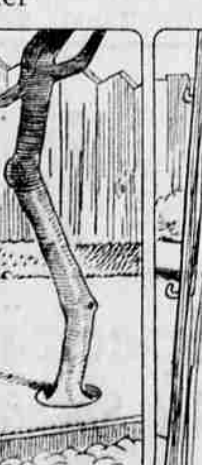
