Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Yesterday completed the consideration of cases in which the partner of an initial bidder should jump the initial bid; today we shall begin the consideration of over-calls in some declaration other than the one named by partner. In Contract, rescuing bids are unknown; there is no such thing as a weakness bid. Consequently, whether the partner is taking out an original No Trump or an original suit-bid, the take-out shows strength.

When one partner has started by bidding one of a Major, the other partner should jump when his hand contains strength and normal support for the Major; doing when he is strong elsewhere and lacks normal support in his partner's suit; pass when he lacks strength, whether holding normal support or not.

What is Normal Support?

Just as in Auction Bridge, normal support for partner's suit is any three or more cards of the suit, or its Ace or King with at least one other card. Queen and one other is the doubtful borderline holding; it may prove to be either a liability or an asset.

With unquestionable normal support, a denial of partner's suit by bidding No Trump is rarely advisable unless the hand has most unusual strength and the other three suits all so thoroughly taken care of, that a bid of two or three No Trumps is thoroughly justified.

With Queen-X hands, a No Trump take-out is frequently advisable although it may look like denial; the following would be an example. (Partner has bid one Spade).

♠Q-X
♥K-X-X
♦A-J-X-X
♣Q-J-X

It must be remembered that four and five-card Majors are frequently bid originally, when the bidder also has No Trump strength in two other suits, and in all such cases a denial by a No Trump take-out is most important as it marks the way to a game-going No Trump in many cases in which the game would not be there in the Major.

When you have less than normal support for your partner's Major and have No Trump strength (a count of 8 upon the bases of Ace 4, King 3, Queen 2 and Jack 1) in at least two suits, overall with one No Trump, when you have less than normal support and your hand counts 10 and has the other three suits stopped, bid two No Trumps; if the count is 14, the other three suits being stopped, bid three No Trumps.

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MENUS

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, cream, broiled cottage ham, creamed potatoes, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Lima bean loaf, apple and raisin salad, plain cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER—Baked spaghetti and veal, head lettuce with Thousand Island dressing, stuffed figs with whipped cream, sponge cake, milk, coffee.

These are simple "between season" meals that are well balanced and nourishing. Lima bean loaf makes an excellent main dish for luncheon but the salad with its lettuce as well as apples and raisins must be firmly stressed.

Lima Bean Loaf

One cup dried lima beans, 1 large onion, 2 tablespoons melted bacon fat, ½ teaspoon paprika, ½ teaspoon salt.

Soak beans overnight in water to cover after thorough washing. In the morning cook in the water in which they soaked, until tender and quite soft. Add water as necessary to prevent sticking. Drain and rub beans through a sieve. Add onion minced, bacon fat, salt and paprika. Mix well and pack into a well buttered brick shaped pan. Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Turn
