PEACE TREATY PARLEY URGED

British, Germans, Italians and Japanese Asked to Join U. S., France

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13 (AP)—Great Britain, Germany, Italy and Japan were invited today to join France and the United States in the negotiations of a world-wide treaty binding the nations not to resort to war with one another.

The invitation was extended by Secretary Kellogg, after an agreement on the procedure with Aristide Briand, foreign minister of France.

In a note to the four governments, presented simultaneously at London, Berlin, Rome and Tokyo today, by American diplomatic representatives, Mr. Kellogg outlined the discussions on the proposal between himself and M. Briand, and submitted a draft representing in a general way the form of treaty the United States is prepared to sign. Its language is practically identical with the original treaty proposed by M. Briand to the U. S. last June.

The four governments were told the U. S. would be pleased to be informed as promptly as may be convenient whether they are in a position to give favorable consideration to the conclusion of a treaty such as transmitted and, if not, what specific modifications in the text would make it acceptable.

With the note and draft treaty were presented a copy of the text of M. Briand's original proposal and copies of all the correspondence which have been made public heretofore. The views of the two governments, Mr. Kellogg said, were clearly set forth in the correspondence.

The government of the United States, as stated in its note of Feb. 27, 1928, desires to see the institution of war abolished. Mr. Kellogg's note declared, "and stands ready to conclude with the French, British, German, Italian and Japanese governments, a single multilateral treaty open to subsequent adherence by any and all other governments binding the parties thereto not to resort to war with one another."

Nameless Man To Face World Again

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 13 (AP)—Nameless, and lacking any memory of his past life, a man who came to the police station nearly three weeks ago as an amnesia victim asking help to identify himself, has started out in the world again to make his own way.

After being under observation at the police emergency hospital for more than a week, and making futile efforts to regain recollection of his past the man tried several ways to find work in Portland, returning each night to the police station for lodging. Finally despairing of either recovering his personality or getting a job he set out yesterday on the "open road" bound north, probably to Seattle. His identity still shrouded in mystery.

Senator Heflin Attacks Al Again

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13 (AP)—Senator Heflin, of Alabama, made another attack on Gov. Smith of New York today in the senate, charging that he was the head of the Roman Catholic political machine in America.

"There are two standards in this country," Heflin shouted to a full chamber and crowded galleries. "They are the Roman standard and the American standard. When they clash one must go down and it will not be the American standard."

Senator Curtis sought to invoke a rule to prevent the address, but was over-ruled by Vice President Dawes. The Kansasan then reminded Heflin that the senate was to go into executive session at 2 p. m., and it was the desire to dispose of the naval appropriation bill first.

NO TRACE OF BREMEN—ONLY WILD RUMORS

should the trans-Atlantic Bremen at last arrive.

Optimism which had been unreasonably buoyant earlier, waned steadily and gave way to just as unreasonably pessimism.

When unconfirmed reports began to drift around of a plane seen in Nova Scotia, they were accepted as a fact. Lack of verification, however, resulted in a spreading cynicism and when later rumors came in of a plane seen over Maine and Massachusetts they were received with scoffing doubt.

At 2 p. m. almost 48 hours after the Bremen left Ireland the crowd at the field was roughly estimated at 3000.

BAD WINDS

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13 (AP)—The weather bureau and navy hydrographers feared today that the German plane Bremen would have to fight head winds all the way down the coast that might delay their arrival at Mitchell field.

WATCHERS BUSY

BOSTON, Apr. 13 (AP)—Reports of unidentified airplanes seen at a half dozen scattered points in New England today kept watchers for the German trans-Atlantic plane Bremen busy without bringing to light any definite information.

Weather conditions through most of New England were clear and a watch was maintained along the entire coast from Eastport, Maine, south to Long Island Sound. Ships and radio stations were on the alert for any sight of the plane or any wireless messages from points along the route the Bremen was expected to follow upon its arrival on the American side of the Atlantic.

Observers at Nashua, N. H., reported having seen a monoplane flying high above that city but they were unable to distinguish any identifying marks. A similar report came from Windham, N. H., and later from Massachusetts points in the vicinity of Worcester. None of the observers was able to identify the plane.

PLANE SEEN OVER KINGSPORT

KINGSPORT, N. S., Apr. 13 (AP)—A plane flying very high and proceeding west southwest, was sighted over Kingsport at 10:20 o'clock Atlantic standard time this morning by Captain Barkhouse, of the Canadian government marine steamer Arctis.

Captain Barkhouse said it was too high to distinguish any markings, but he was sure it was the German plane Bremen.

He said several other persons saw and heard the plane.

Kingsport is on the west shore of Minas Basin, on the north coast of Nova Scotia, four miles from Canning. It is a rail point. It is about 500 miles from New York in an air line.

The sighting at 9:30 a. m. Eastern standard time would mean that

the plane, if the Bremen, was very nearly on both courses and thus for her flight to Mitchell field, N. Y.

Aviators believed that the monoplane would have ample fuel left for the balance of the flight. It would face a westerly wind but clear weather over most of the remaining distance.

Efforts were being made to ascertain if the plane was seen or heard farther west, on the coast bordering the bay of Fundy, but it was pointed out that the craft probably passed over this district without being detected, owing to the height at which it was flying.

Clarence Patterson, an overseas man, said he heard the plane for five minutes while working here but could not see it. The weather is clear. Both Captain Barkhouse and Mr. Patterson said no other plane was known to be operating in the district.

Three men who were in the other car, he said, helped him carry the injured girl to the field nearby. The youth said, according to officers, that the injured girl was not dead at that time and may have trodden to death. The lower picture shows Grootegood, surrounded by detectives holding the dead girl's coat which was found in a pile of rubbish in his father's garage. Discovery of the coat led to his arrest.
