

STOCKS BOUNDING UP TO NEW PEAKS

General Motors Reach 199 1/2—Closing Strong with Sales at 4,300,000

NEW YORK, Apr. 12 (AP)—Prices of gilt edged stocks were sent bounding upward on the stock exchange today when group buying expanded with lower call loan rates. Advances of \$5 to \$12 a share were numerous among high grade public utility, tobacco and railroad issues. General Motors reached 199 1/2, a new record price, late in the day and General Electric \$168.50 and New York Central at 182 were at record levels.

The closing was strong. Shares with a background of substantial earnings or favorable business prospects were heavily purchased in the late afternoon, particularly public utility and tobacco issues. Further scaling down of money rates to 4 1/2 per cent had a stimulating effect on sentiment. Lehigh Valley moved up 10 points and Philadelphia company, Consolidated Gas, Brooklyn Union Gas and the American Tobacco and Liggett and Myers stocks 5 to 8. Radio had a sudden drop of 5 points to below 170. Total sales approximated 4,300,000 shares.

Wheat Higher At Close of Market

CHICAGO, Apr. 12 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 1 1/2c off with May showing less setback than new crop months, the wheat market displayed only moderate power to recover. Corn and oats were also lower, corn starting 1/4 to 3/8 down, and subsequently holding near to the initial range. Provisions kept about steady.

Wheat closed strong, 1c to 2 1/2c net higher; corn 1/2 to 3/8 up; oats showing 1/2 to 3/8 advance and provisions 1/2 to 1/4c down.

Butter Markets Steady to Firm In Portland, Ore.

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 14 (AP)—Butter markets here were steady to a shade firmer today with many dealers inclined to believe the bottom has been reached in the price movement.

First were advanced 1/2 to 27 1/2c. Reports from Seattle and California say that storage of butter is commencing, although practically none has gone into storage here as yet. Pacific coast storage holdings increased 21,070 pounds last week, it was reported, with the total holdings placed at 298,479 pounds, an increase of over 40,000 pounds over last year at this time.

Except for an increase of 1 1/2c in the price of medium firsts, egg quotations were steady and unchanged yesterday. Receipts yesterday were 2,499 cases, of which 1,481 went into storage, swelling the total to 25,555 cases.

Country dressed meats and poultry were steady and unchanged, with trading rather light.

Longer broccol was likewise very scarce and brought from \$1.75 to \$2.25 per crate.

Potato prices were weak, with trading dull.

WOOL REPORT
BOSTON, Apr. 12 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:
"The wool market, generally speaking, has been very quiet this week. Prices are very firm on medium wools, which readily find a market for all available stocks, while fine wools which are in comparatively fair supply, find the market slow and rather in favor of the buyer. Reports from the goods market indicate a slow market."
"In the west shearing is gradually spreading. Contracting is at a minimum, with growers generally holding above the level of what buyers are at present willing to pay."
"The foreign markets are all quiet and Bradford is no more than steady."
"Locally there is little or nothing being done in mohair. The Texas market is practically closed."

Clarence Thompson Freed From Prison

SALEM, Ore., Apr. 12 (AP)—Clarence Thompson, who three and a half years ago was sent to the state penitentiary for embezzling \$5,000 state funds while holding the position of cashier in the state treasurer's office under Treasurer O. P. Hoff and Jefferson Myers, was freed yesterday under a conditional pardon from Gov. Patterson.

The governor's action was recommended by the state parole board. Wednesday, making him eligible for clemency, and since he had no scores against him as a prisoner the pardon was granted. One of the conditions is that Thompson live outside the state, and that he will live in the state of Washington.
