PINK EYE

The most common inflammatory condition of the eye is conjunctivitis (pink eye). This may be acute or chronic. The acute type is quite often contagious and may attack one or both eyes of individuals of any age. It is found among groups of children very often. It usually comes on quite suddenly, accompanied by itching, burning, discomfort, produced by light, and a sensation of something like sand in the eye, and very early there is a discharge with glutin together of the lids in the morning.

This discharge often appears in the form of flakes and strings and is the cause of the blurred vision. It forms a film over the front part of the eye and makes it appear as though one is seeing through a fog. The lids may be more or less swollen and the outside of the lids and white part of the eyeball very red. If this condition becomes very marked, more or less severe complications such as ulcers and iritis may develop, manifesting by increase of pain and light discomfort. It may run its course and completely clear up without treatment in from one to four weeks but, since it is quite contagious and infectious, complications may develop later and also, since it is very annoying as well as harmful to one's efficiency, it is best to have it treated and cleared up in a few days. It is wise to have it diagnosed as pink eye early, because there are several other much more serious conditions that look like pink eye and which, if left to run their course, may produce irreparable damage.

Among these conditions is trachoma, or granular lids, which presents some of the signs and symptoms of pink eye, such as irritation, light disturbance, tearing, and discharge. This disease is chronic, is very difficult to treat and, if left to run its course, always results in blindness. Gonorrheal conjunctivitis presents the following appearance: Redness, swelling, and temperature of the lids inside and out with much thin yellowish secretion in which float flakes of pus. This discharge later becomes profuse, thick and yellow. The eye is tender to touch. The patient has slight fever. This condition is very serious, the severity increasing with the age of the patient. It is claimed that 17 percent of these cases become blind.

Pioneer's Death
Recalls Page of
Oregon History

SAN FERNANDO, Cal., Apr. 14 (AP)—Another page of tragic western romance was closed yesterday with the death here of Mrs. Matilda Sager Delaney, 88 years old.

At the age of seven years Matilda Sager started across the plains with her parents and six brothers and sisters. The year was 1847. Savage Indians attacked the oxen train and killed the mother and father of the seven children. The children reached the Whitman mission, six miles from the present site of Walla Walla, Wash. Marcus Whitman, the kindly missionary, adopted the seven children as his own. Two years later Indians attacked the mission. Whitman, his wife and all the men were killed in the massacre and the seven Sager children were taken as hostages by the Indians. Later they were purchased from their savage captors. Matilda Sager married and settled at Yreka, Cal.

Six years ago she came here to live with her daughter, George Remus, Cincinnati bootleg king, who killed his wife last fall and was found insane by a jury, has been found sane now and wants his liberty. Why all the delay?
