Boat on Display Here.
A window display in the W. H. Bohlenkamp company's store here has been attracting much attention during the past few days. The principal attraction of the display is a boat, which was recently purchased by Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Bohlenkamp Sr., and which they will take to Walla Walla Lake to be used on the lake there. The boat was built by the Henson Boat company of Bonanza, N. Y., and is a type of safe, fast boat for family use. It is constructed of cedar, spruce and mahogany, canvas covered. The railing, seats and trim are of solid mahogany. The boat is propelled by a 15-horse power Evinrude outboard motor, the type motor being the present holder of the world's speed record, it is said. The boat weighs 240 pounds and the motor 44 pounds, and with one person will travel at a rate of 28 or 30 miles an hour. It will carry seven ordinary sized persons, the driver's seat being at the back of the boat, which is six feet long and 52 inches wide. The boat was purchased after a study had been made during the winter of the various types of boats by Lynne Bohlenkamp. "It is the newest thing in a safe, fast boat," Mr. Bohlenkamp said yesterday. A trailer is now being built to take the boat to the lake, and a new boat house will be constructed here. The window display was arranged by Lynne Bohlenkamp, assisted by Ethel Penny, decorator for N. H. West and company.

To Hug North Shore.
The Canadian steamer Montcalm, which has been battling the lee fogs in Belle Isle straits since Saturday attempting to reach the north shore, was still several more miles from her destination, half off shore by the lee barrier, Captain Mercer wired the government station at Halifax he hoped to be able to reach the island by hugging the north shore if the wind continued in the west.

BREMEN ARRIVAL GIVEN IN STORY

Canadian Paper Prints First-Hand Account of End of Journey

ST. JOHN, N. B., Apr. 17 (By Canadian Press).—The Times Globe and Telegraph Journal today prints a first-hand account by Miss Greta Ferris of The Grenfell Mission, of the arrival of the Bremen at Greenly island and the reception of the three trans-Atlantic aviators.

Her message, sent by wireless and telephone, was told with accents of brevity.

"Bremen 35 hours Dublin to Greenly island," it said.

"For most of way. Arrived noon Friday, April 13. Mistook light-house for steamer frozen in ice. Lost bearings and compass inaccurate. Plane broke through fog. Injured axle, bent propeller. Still in same position. Plane hoisted on gasoline tank and hoisted."

"Baron cold and exhausted." The simple narrative continued, "fearing that they would never reach land. Ready to shoot companions if worst came to worst."

"Baron came at once to light-house where given dry footgear. Refused to eat until his companions left plane first. First meal was biscuits and fresh milk. Baron feels the cold and anxious to reach New York."

"Flammarion says Labrador is not Ireland—is warmer there. Koehl does not complain; all very modest. Most thankful to have accomplished such a feat."

RELIEF SHIP TAKES FLIERS FROM ISLAND

Additional details as to the damage to the plane were received in messages from W. S. Barrett, radio operator at Point Amour, 25 miles from the shore of the Atlantic, and from the German baron himself.

Wings Intact.
The baron wired Robert Cannon, a director of the Canadian Trans-Continental Airways at Montreal, that the wheels, cabin and propeller of the Bremen were badly damaged but that the wings were intact. Barrett's message said the shaft was damaged but repairable. The Point Amour operator's message also brought additional details of the peril which the fliers faced in their ocean flight and the difficulty of their landing.

"The plane had fog and snow during part of its flight," his message said, "took Greenly island light-house for sealing steamer but ascertained that it was light-house shortly afterwards and made landing on small pond. Crew were rather exhausted but quite recovered after short time."

Miss Herta Junkers, representative in the United States for her father's company, leaders of the Bremen, flew the P-12 to Montreal from New York yesterday in three and a half hours. With her were Fred Melchior, her pilot, and Edward Junkers, her brother, a Junkers mechanic with additional spare parts were being waiting for them, having been sent ahead by train.

Miss Junkers today was endeavoring to locate a few drums of benzol, the high pressure fuel used by the Bremen, to send back to Greenly island with the repair parts.

Just before the Bremen left Ireland Major Flammarion gave an interview to the Associated Press in which he said future generations would view as madmen such flights as he was attempting.

"Flying the Atlantic in the Bremen or any other plane is hardly a stunt," he said. "Valuable scientific data will be obtained but the public must be prepared for something entirely different in air-plane and engine construction to be the dream of ocean air service is ever realized."

"We know the secrets of flight," he said.

The future princess is Miss Setsuko Matsudaira, shown at the right. She is 29 years old and is the eldest daughter of Ambassador Matsudaira, Japan's envoy to the United States. A keen supporter of western athletics, she herself is expert at tennis and golf. She now is a student in the Friends' School at Washington, D. C.

Prince Chichibu (lower left) also is a zealous sportsman. Mountain climbing, baseball and track events are his favorites. Partly due to his education at Oxford University, he is said to be thoroughly democratic.

Many a Japanese flapper like the one pictured upper left now disregards her conservative training and goes in for modern dress and sports. But thousands of others eagerly are awaiting the sanction of a royal precedent such as will be furnished by the marriage of the crown prince.

Wife No. 2 Aids Man To Escape, Officers Claim

REDDING, Cal., Apr. 17 (AP).—Roy D. Kelly, whose two wives met and comforted each other over Kelly's hospital bed recently, today took his guards pistol and escaped from the county hospital here.

Kelly was shot through the lung by a Chico policeman who sought to arrest him on a charge of issuing fictitious checks. Two wives went to his bedside and learned of each other's existence.

Brought here for treatment and prosecution both wives followed him to Redding and police said they suspected that Mrs. Kelly No. 2 who was denied admittance to the hospital helped Kelly to escape when Lee Hendrick, his guard, had left the room.

The man's condition was believed too dangerous to permit a court hearing but physicians said today he probably pretended his condition was more serious than it really was.

Sheriff's officers and a posse are seeking Kelly and his second wife.

GEORGE G. BUESING.
Word received of the sudden death of George G. Buesing, was a distinct shock to his many friends and relatives in this community inasmuch as his condition up until his demise, which occurred Sunday April 15, seemed steadily improving. Buesing was 39 years of age, a native of the United States Veterans Hospital No. 88, located at Fort Lyon Colorado, Mr. Buesing having been a patient in that institution since May 15th 1927, afflicted with advanced tuberculosis, presumably resultant from gas attacks which he suffered in the World war.

George G. Buesing was born in Warsaw, Ill., July 1, 1888, and at the age of 10 years moved with the family to La Grande, Oregon, locating in the Grande Ronde Valley where he had resided and being associated with his brothers in extensive farming until his enlistment in the World War June 5 1917, serving as Sergeant with Co. C, 114th Engineers, (Oregon) being credited with 15 months foreign service.

After Mr. Buesing was released from military service he engaged in the oil drilling operations in Wyoming, Montana, and Old Mexico, while in Mexico he was taken ill and committed to the veterans hospital No. 36 in Colorado.

Mr. Buesing was a member of La Grande post 43 American Legion and La Grande lodge 432 B. P. O. Elks.

He leaves to mourn his loss his wife, Mrs. Margaret Buesing, of Great Falls, Mont., five sisters and five brothers Mrs. J. H. Henson, Warsaw, Ill., Will Buesing, Elgin, Ill., Mrs. Ed Meyerich, Henry, Ore., Benjamin and John of La Grande, Mrs. Bruce Clark, Allied, Ore., Mrs. John B. Clark, Mrs. J. B. A big man just stuck his head in the door and said: "Mr. Pratt, you got me in trouble."
