Baker, a former Oregon Aggie college star, probably would have been regular shortstop this year had not Ray Rhyne been purchased from the Pittsburgh Nationals. Secretary George A. Put-



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nam said if Baker had been retained by the Seals he would have played about a dozen games this season whereas he will be in the lineup daily with the Pirates.
