

Give Geography Of Wallows In Smith's Article

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Apr. 20 (Special).—The geography of the Wallowa mountains and country of northeastern Oregon is covered in an article written by Warren D. Smith, head of the department of geology at the University of Oregon, which will appear in the forthcoming issue of the Commonwealth Review, scholarly publication of the university. Results of an exhaustive study made by the university geologists and students during a summer camp held in the Wallowa mountains are given in the discussion.

"The article is one of a series dealing with the physical and economic aspects of the geography of Oregon," being directed by Dr. Smith. In the Wallowa mountains, the investigator states, "are perhaps the greatest sources of hydro-electric power in all eastern and central Oregon," and suggests the industrial development this resource should ultimately bring. Natural resources, including scenery and recreational possibilities, quarrying, mining, hydro-electric power, and lumbering, far exceed the cultural resources, and demand immediate and vigorous expansion, Dr. Smith reports.

Dr. Smith was aided in preparing the extensive report by Marjorie Clark, San Diego; Herman Moberg, Hillsboro; and James Stewart, Lakeview. All are students in the department of geology here.

Walsh, Reed and Smith Battle for California; G. O. P. Behind Hoover

SAN FRANCISCO (AP).—With the republican party in California united in support of the candidacy of a favored son, Secretary Herbert C. Hoover, voters are looking to the rival camp of the democrats to supply the political pyrotechnics for the May 1 presidential primary.

Only Hoover delegates appear at the republican ballot, and by agreement these were selected by the campaign committee so there would be no contest between the progressive and conservative wings as to whose followers would cast the party's 25 votes for the secretary of commerce at the Kansas City convention.

No such unanimity, however, obtains in the democratic ranks. Here the old fight between the McAdoo and Smith factions has been renewed and widened into a three-way split through the active entry into the fight of Senator James H. Smith of Missouri.

Other than for changes in the personnel of the field forces, the McAdoo-Smith alignment is much the same as four years ago. But former U. S. Senator James D. Phelan, who in 1924 placed McAdoo in nomination for the presidency, now leads the delegation pledged to Smith. McAdoo, instead of being the official choice of the state's democracy for the party's standard bearer, is a candidate for delegate to the convention. He is heading his own forces, however, in the campaign against Smith, supporting Senator Thomas J. Walsh, of Montana, as the choice for the democratic nomination.

The democrats have 28 delegates to choose for the Houston convention, but only 26 votes.

While there has never been a court ruling, it is generally understood that the candidate group elected under an expressed preference for a certain presidential aspirant is pledged to that nominee until he releases them.

The McAdoo-Smith adherents have campaigned as "dry, Woodrow Wilson, anti-Tammany" democrats. Reed has been supported on the slogan, "Honest government" with prohibition termed "not an issue."

The Smith support has developed little campaign oratory, but has been marked by quiet and extensive organization.

Among the prominent candidates for delegate are three women: Mrs. Gertrude Atherton, favoring Smith; Kathleen Norris, adhering to the McAdoo-Walsh camp, and Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general, pledged to Hoover.

Governor C. C. Young, progressive republican, is among the outstanding supporters of the Hoover candidacy.

The socialists have no tickets for the first time in years. The prohibitionists have a complete set of delegates pledged to Daniel A. Poling.
