Daylight Savings In Effect Apr. 29

NEW YORK (AP)—The daylight saving season is on again and soon to begin in three entire states and in hundreds of cities in 14 other states.

In New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, a generally observed in cities using the altered schedule, clocks will be pushed back an hour at 2 a. m. on April 29, last Sunday in the month, and will remain thus until September 30.

In some places, however, daylight saving began as early as March 2 and in others it will be inaugurated as late as June.

Some form of daylight saving will be observed in all or parts of the cities of Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Delaware, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin.

Since her divorce from the Marquis the duchess was married to the Duke de Talleyrand.

Meredith Coup Is Planned By His Adherents

DES MOINES, Ia., Apr. 20 (AP)—Outnumbered more than five to one in the number of pledged delegates, Iowa democrats favoring E. E. Meredith, former secretary of agriculture, for their presidential choice, plan to raid the province of more than 571 uncommitted delegates in the state democratic convention here today.

They hope thus to muster enough strength to defeat instruction of the state's 26 delegates to the party national convention for Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York.

In pledged delegates the Meredith forces now have less than 150 votes of the 667 necessary to control the state convention. Smith instructed delegates total approximately 500, or about 117 short of convention control. Early claims of the Smith group listed more than 100 "favorable" delegates among the uncommitted forces, while the Meredith faction claimed assurances from nearly 100 in the unpledged bloc.

Patting to obtain sufficient strength to control the convention, the Meredith group may concentrate its final convention effort to prevent instruction of any kind.

Interest in today's gathering, which will bring to a climax the hotly contested presidential preference campaign in Iowa, centers in contests over 33 delegates from Polk and Woodbury counties, containing the two largest cities—Des Moines and Sioux City.

Each of the counties elected two sets of convention delegates, favoring Smith and Meredith respectively. The contests will be ones for the credentials committee to settle.

U. S. Hens Regain Their Supremacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — American hens during 1927 won back their rightful place in international trade. They provided more goods for export from this country than their foreign rivals were able to create for imports.

During several years the hen of the United States has been laying back in the race for foreign trade, and there has been more than a little head shaking among the savants who study economic trends because of her failure. In 1925 and

1926 the United States actually imported more poultry products than it exported, which is a sad state of affairs for a country that traditionally surpasses all the world in the production of fowl products.

But in 1927 the hen staged a magnificent comeback. American exports of poultry products—mostly eggs—have been figured out by the commerce department to have a value of \$9,844,000, while imports were worth but 9,335,000.

Canada is the chief rival of the United States in the western poultry trade, and naturally the two countries are also the best markets for each other's products.

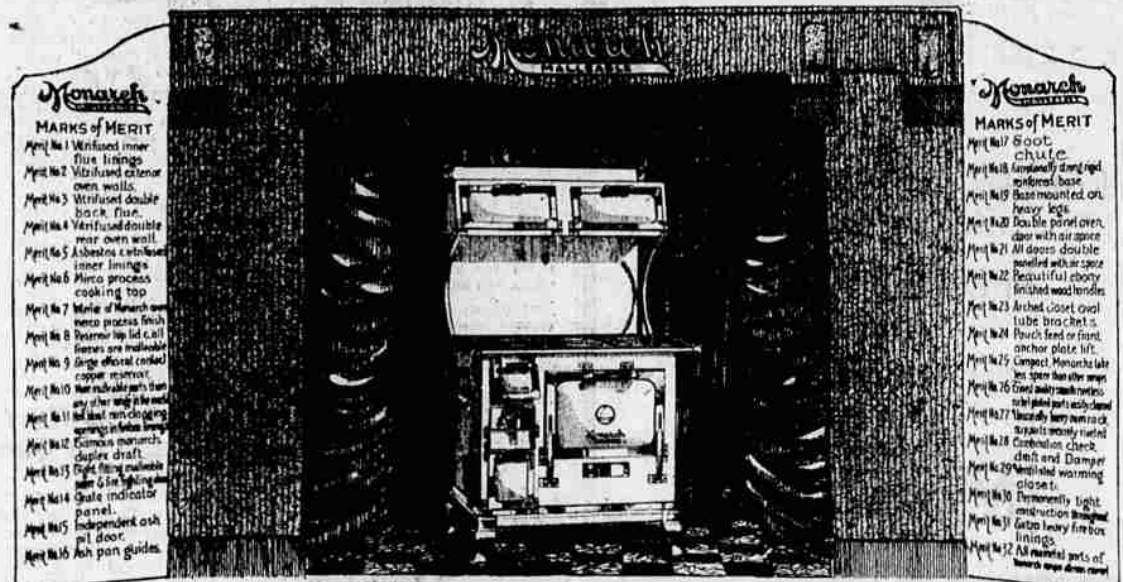
