## BEAR RAIDS IN STREET SUCCEED

### Prices in Stock Exchange Break Sharply—Closing Is Irregular

NEW YORK, Apr. 20 (AP)—Prices on the New York stock exchange broke sharply at the opening on selling inspired by higher discount rates and the huge increase in brokers' loans, and then staged a remarkable recovery which wiped out most of the losses and sent a score of issues to new high grounds. Early losses ranged from 2 to 7 points, but strong buying quickly appeared and by early afternoon more than a score issues were selling 2 to 6 points above yesterday's final quotations. Trading was in tremendous volume.

New York Transactions were again heavily bought in anticipation of a favorable federal court decision on the application for a 7c fare. New peak prices for the year, or longer, were registered by U. S. Leather common and preferred A. Container corporation, Otis Steel Prior preferred and several others.

The closing was irregular. Related selling orders came into the market in the last hour with a good deal of profit-taking in consequence of the weekend holiday which produced confusion.

Dupont, Radio, International Nickel and Huscon Motors slid down rather easily, while Interborough Rapid Transit, Third Avenue Railway, International Cement and the oil stocks upward at a good rate. Total sales approximated 3,750,000 shares.

### WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Apr. 20 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"The wool market is marking time for the moment, as is also the case with the market for goods. Occasional small piecing out sales are reported and some buying forwarded by manufacturers when prices suit, but the market as a whole is no more than steady, although most dealers are optimistic concerning the future.

"In the west there is little that is new, scattering purchases being at unchanged prices. Foreign markets are generally quiet with prices barely steady in Bradford.

"Mohair is quiet at the eastern seaboard markets and manufacturers are by no means ready to absorb the prices recently paid at country points."

CHICAGO, Apr. 20 (AP)—Opening at 1 1/2 to 2 3/4c off, Chicago wheat rallied somewhat but subsequently dropped lower than before. Corn and oats were also weak, corn starting at 1/2 to 3/4c decline and then keeping within initial range. Provisions tended upward. Wheat closed unsettled, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2c net lower; corn 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c off; oats 1 1/2 to 1 3/4c down and provisions 3 to 2 1/2c up.

### Poultry Prices

#### Cent Lower All Around Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 20 (AP)—Poultry prices were about a cent lower all around today, following several days of large receipts. Good sized broilers were none too plentiful and held steady.

Country dressed meats showed little change, with the market generally slow. Veal receipts continued heavy and the price weak around 18-19c. Other classes were quotably steady.

Butter and egg prices were steady and unchanged today. Yesterday's receipts of butter were 14,350 pounds and of eggs 2,712 cases. Storage holdings were: Butter 11,773 pounds; eggs 31,794 cases.

Wholesale produce prices were generally higher today on local markets caused by the continued rain and cold weather in nearby growing districts. Weather conditions in California have likewise been unfavorable and early crops about the coast are generally backward.

Spinach was scarce today and the market strong, best offerings going to the trade at \$1.15-1.25 per crate.
