Convert Day To Be Observed By Local Church

Other Services of Worship of City Tomorrow Promise to Be Interesting.

Several interesting church services are promised for the city tomorrow. The Nazarene church will observe "Convert Day" at 9:45 o'clock in the morning and at 6:30 o'clock in the evening. The Central Christian church and the new members of the congregation who have come into the church since the present pastor began his ministry will be seated in the center of the auditorium. A total of 125 new members have been added in the past year. The service will be an evangelistic meeting and the home workers. There will be special music during the morning worship hour at 11 o'clock, and the pastor, the Rev. R. L. Putnam, will give a sermon on the subject "What It Means to be a Member of the Church." This service will be one of interest to every church member.

The Bible school will meet at 9:45 o'clock in the morning and the "Christian Endeavor societies" will meet at 6:30 o'clock in the evening. The Junior, Intermediate, young people's and senior societies will meet in their respective places. Following the regular evening service at 7:30 o'clock there will be an evangelistic nature, and the pastor will have as his sermon subject "Giving Our Best." In addition to the sermon there will be a song service, with the young people's choir and the orchestra assisting.

English Lutheran Church

The Rev. H. A. Awes, pastor of the English Lutheran church, will deliver the second sermon on the general subject "How Christ Appears Today," Sunday morning at the 11 o'clock hour of worship. 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Pastor Resigns; Will Spend One More Week Here

The Rev. L. D. Meggers Will Be Succeeded Here by the Rev. Guy Sharp

The Rev. L. D. Meggers has resigned his position as pastor of the Church of the Nazarene here and Sunday evening, April 29, he will occupy the pulpit of the local church as pastor for the last time. The Rev. Guy Sharp, of Duhl, Idaho, will succeed him and will begin his duties as pastor of the church on Monday, May 6.

The end of next week will mark the end of Mr. Meggers' three years of work in La Grande, and during that time much has been accomplished by the church. When he first came to La Grande the church was merely an organized body and owned no property. Since then a church has been built, and the church now owns property valued around \$3000, including the church and parsonage. In the three year period the church membership has been doubled many times, and the church activities have increased along every line.

On Monday, April 30, Mr. Meggers will leave La Grande, going from here to Nampa, Idaho, where he will attend the district assembly of the church. In a few weeks he will go from there to Columbus, Ohio where he will attend the general assembly of the church, at the end of which he will return to this section to accept a pastorate in the Northwest district, which includes Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho.

The Rev. Mr. Sharp will be accompanied to La Grande by his wife, who is said to be an accomplished musician, and his little daughter, Joan. Mr. Sharp is a graduate of the Northwest Nazarene college and is known to be very efficient in his work. The church here is very fortunate to get him as pastor, the Rev. L. D. Meggers declares.

Yearly Conference Will Be Tomorrow

An interesting program will be given tomorrow afternoon at the Letting Day Service, beginning at 12:15 o'clock, when the yearly conference of the primary association of the First ward will be held there. The conference consists of a demonstration of the past year's work in the primary association and about 50 children will take part in the program.

The child who is freely and frankly praised for the things that parents can honestly commend, is saved from the perils that beset the child who is never given the encouragement of appreciative comment.

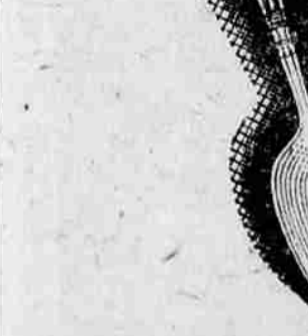
WINNOWINGS

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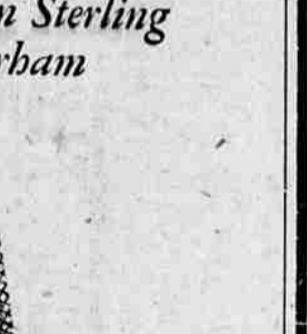

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Horse Is Savior Of Homesteader In Klamath Area

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., APR. 21 (AP)—From the wilds of Southern Klamath has come a tale of how horse-sense saved the life of a homesteader, Frank Sevits. Severely injured from a fall, Sevits managed to crawl to his remote cabin located far off the beaten track of civilization. With sufficient food but without water, he suffered alone in the wilderness with none but his horse for company.

In desperation Sevits scrawled a note attached to a string, tied the string around the neck of his horse and released the animal from his tether.

The equine trotted off into the woods and Sevits crawled back into his cabin, with the thought his last chance was staked on proverbial "horse-sense."

Two days later two lumberjacks, whose names were not ascertained, were trekking across one of the many trails of Southern Klamath. They were attracted by a horse which had followed them for miles. At first paying no attention to the animal, the lumberjacks were finally moved to stop and look at the animal.

The horse trotted up to the two men and impatiently pawed the ground with its front hoofs. One of the lumberjacks espied the note, and with the horse in the lead the two men were soon on their way to the lonely homestead.

A few hours later Sevits was being given first aid and is now on the road to recovery. His trusty horse, needless to say, is the hero of the hour.
