PORK PRICES GO UP IN PORTLAND

Veal Remains Weak with Top Quotations Around 18c; Receipts Heavy

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 24 (AP)—For the first time in several months, pork prices went above 14c on local country dressed meat markets with the top for best light hogs around 14 1/2c to a shade higher. Indications that packers will absorb the bulk of offerings at the yards point to a firm market for some time.

Veal remained weak today with top quotations around 18c for the best. Receipts have been unusually heavy. Beef was moving readily today and prices were steady to a shade higher. Quotations on lambs were unchanged, springers bringing 30 1/2c to 32c while old crop lambs sold from 28 to 28c, depending on weight and grade.

No changes were noticeable in poultry prices, but trading was fairly active and receipts moved out well. Large size broilers were more plentiful but the price held about steady.

Except for a drop of a cent or standard extras to 24 1/2c, egg values held steady. Last week's prices today. Yesterday's receipts were 1,316 cases with 32,646 cases reported in storage, an increase of 206 cases for the day.

Predictions last week that the butter market had perhaps reached its low level for the season were borne out today by firmness in the market generally and an increase of 1/2c in the quotation on cube extras to 32 1/2c. Yesterday's receipts were 11,442 pounds, with 17,129 pounds reported in storage.

Lindy to Carry Serum to Bennett

CURTIS FIELD, N. Y., Apr. 24 (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, the lone eagle of the Atlantic, took the air today to fly as he never flew before in a race to save the life of a fellow airman, Floyd Bennett.

Lindbergh hopped off at 3:08 p. m., carrying anti-pneumonia serum needed by doctors tending the north pole flier in Quebec where he was taken after being stricken with pneumonia while commanding a relief expedition to the marooned transatlantic flier on Greenly Island.

MONTREAL, Apr. 24 (Canadian Press)—Mayor Heude announced this afternoon that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh had told him by telephone that he would land here and complete his trip to Quebec with serum for Floyd Bennett by special train.

Wheat Market Closes Strong In Chicago

CHICAGO, Apr. 24 (AP)—Opening 1/2 to 3/4c lower, Chicago wheat sagged a little more but afterwards showed power to rally. Corn was also weaker, starting 1/4 to 1/2c off and subsequently holding near to initial figures. Oats developed firmness. Provisions also tended upward.

Wheat closed strong 1 1/2 to 2c higher, corn unchanged to 3/4c up, oats showing 1/2 to 3/4c gain and provisions varying from 2c decline to 1/2c of 22c.

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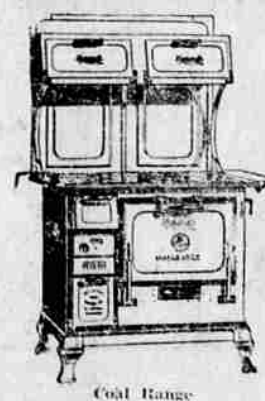
