DEL ALLEN HAS ENVIABLE RECORD

Local Fighter Puts Away 17 Men in 36 Fights—Meets Smith Apr. 28

Del Allen, who fights Fred Smith, of Spokane, in a 16-round main event in Rex hall here Saturday night, has piled up quite an enviable record in the last two years.

Del, fighting whenever the opportunity offered and taking on several boys who the fans figured were too tough for him, nevertheless won 17 of his 36 fights by knockouts and 11 more by decisions. Five fights ended in draws and only three defeats have been chalked up against the La Grande pugilist.

Among the boys he defeated were Johnny "Franklin" Benny Wolfe, Benard Brecken and Johnny Grogins. He fought a draw with Don Frazier, now fighting in San Francisco and other large coast cities. Frazier recently won two decisions over Young Harry Williams.

In the last two weeks Allen has won two fights in Astoria, getting a decision from Ray Wheeler, of Longview, and winning the referee's nod over Young Girl, of Astoria, early this week.

Allen has not fought in La Grande for several weeks and local fans are eager to again see him in action. Present indications are that a large crowd will attend the match, which has been sanctioned by the La Grande boxing commission.

Three other fights are on the card, the first four-round event to begin at 8:45 o'clock.

It was announced this morning that Bud Anderson will be unable to fight Art Holmes, of Walla Walla, in the second four-round event of the card, so Kid Alabama, a local bell boy who is reputed to be a pretty fair scrapper, has been secured as a substitute. Alabama has been under Allen's wing for the last several days and is expected to make his debut to be auspicious.

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 26 (AP)—Ted Thye, light heavyweight title claimant in his farewell appearance before his departure for Australia, took two out of three falls from Al Karasick, here last night. It was a battle of wristlock against headlock. The first fall went to Karasick after 13 minutes, 22 seconds of speedy wrestling. The Russian brought Thye to the mat with a series of headlocks and then stretched him out with a short arm scissors. Falling in his efforts to wristlock Karasick, Thye dived for his legs, securing a crutch hold which brought him the second fall in 30 minutes 24 seconds. The third fall ended after 8 minutes, 46 seconds, when Thye broke Karasick's headlock, picked him up and slammed him to the mat. In the 36 minute preliminary, B. Bismant took one fall and decision from Frank Burns.

Eastern Boxers Win Most Bouts In A.A.U. Games

BOSTON, Apr. 26 (AP)—The eastern boxers carried off most of the honors in the A. A. U. national amateur championship tournament which ended here this morning after three days of boxing. Seven of the eight national titles were won by boys from Massachusetts, New York and Pennsylvania, and the other championship went to a Californian.

Two New Yorkers, Tommy Lown and George Hoffman, won national titles for the second consecutive year. Lown successfully defended his welterweight crown and Hoffman, who had out grown his 175-pound title, replaced it with the heavyweight championship.

Three Massachusetts boys were final victors. Johnny Daley of Waltham took the 118-pound honors. Harry Devine of Worcester, was supreme in the 126-pound division and Ensign Harry H. Henderson of the naval academy, whose home is in Waltham, was the best middleweight in the tournament. Steve Halaliko of Buffalo, led the 135-pound division and Leon Lucas of Philadelphia the only champion to win by a knockout, was the best in the light heavyweight class.

Four years ago the great Fidel Labarba of California, made the American Olympic boxing team by winning the national flyweight title and this morning Jimmy Miller of Los Angeles, stepped into the Olympic berth Labarba gave up when he entered the professional ring. Miller beat Gene Blanco of Boston for the 112-pound championship.

"Heency is very courageous and sympathetic."

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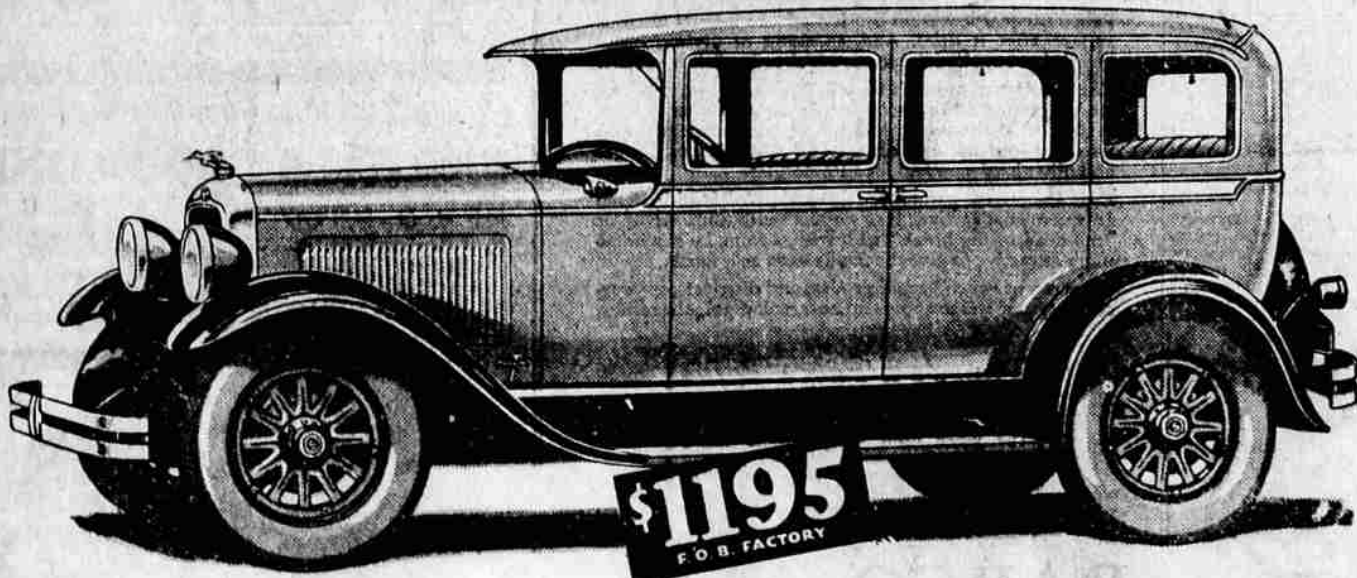
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
