

TALKS UNION OF LARGE CHURCHES

Presbyterian and Methodist Episcopal Faiths to Consider Matter

CHICAGO, Apr. 27 (AP)—Union of the Presbyterian and Methodist Episcopal churches, involving 17,000,000 communicants in 35,000 churches, was presented here by William F. McDerrett, of the promotional department of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The proposal will come official before the supreme bodies of both denominations next month. Dr. Ray Allen, of Hornell, N. Y., will present a memorial for union with the Presbyterians to the annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal church in Kansas City, McDerrett said, and an unnamed delegate to the general assembly to the Presbyterian church at Tulsa, Okla., will offer a similar resolution.

There are approximately 7,000,000 church members with an added 10,000,000 including Sunday school pupils and other adherents, who will be affected if the union takes place. Should the southern branches of both denominations also subscribe to the plan, it would affect almost 24,000,000 persons. The proposal would cause also readjustment of hundreds of millions in property values. The churches have 25,000 churches, 1,000,000 parsonages, hundreds of colleges, hospitals and institutions with a total value of about \$150,000,000. The Presbyterian denomination has 10,000 churches and property valued at \$300,000,000.

Farm Pointers

Color of hay is the most important grading factor under the United States grades, which are official in Oregon. Color indicates quality. To obtain high color and good quality, hay is cut before the color is lost from the plant in the field. Cutting grain hay not later than the soft dough stage and alfalfa in the one-tenth to one-half bloom stage has been found good practice by the experiment station.

Copper carbonate treatment for smut which is standard on wheat is not efficient in preventing smut in oats and barley. The liquid formaldehyde treatment for these grains is recommended by the Oregon experiment station. The copper carbonate dust will not penetrate the hulls of oats and barley sufficiently to kill the smut spores.

A firm seed bed free from weeds has given best results with flax in Oregon. Drilling is the best method of planting but with a loose seed bed the seed is often planted too deeply. Growth will be much less rapid on the loose seed bed because of its tendency to dry out rapidly.

Flax is not so hard on the soil as the general belief indicates, finds the experiment station. The reduction in flax yield from continuous cropping is caused more by competition of weeds and effects of disease than to soil exhaustion. No detrimental effects have been noticed in Oregon when flax is grown in a three or four year rotation with crops that control weeds.

IRISH POPULATION IS OVER HALF FARMERS

DUBLIN (AP)—Of the population of the Irish Free State 53 per cent is engaged in agricultural occupations. But less than 13 per cent of the land is cultivated, and the industry is mainly pastoral. Of Ireland's agricultural workers 74 per cent are the farmers and their families, and only 15 per cent are permanent wage earners.

The Free State imports much of its food. The average annual import of wheat and flour is 522,733 tons. The country itself produces only 30,000 tons of wheat on an average in a year.
