AT THE THEATERS

"Partners In Crime" At The Arcade

Gang warfare, fights to the death, riots, speeding police cars—raw virtue melodrama, richly seasoned with the inimitable comedy of Wallace Beery and Raymond Hatton. That describes "Partners In Crime," the Paramount picture which opened at the Arcade theater last night for a three day run. There is not a single entertainment bet overlooked in this thrilling and highly amusing picture. As a straight melodrama it ranks with the best. As a "situation comedy" it could scarcely be excelled. To cap it all there is an excellent love motif. That makes a triangular combination hard to beat.

Comedians at Rest
 Wallace Beery and Raymond Hatton are at their very best in this picture. The qualities that brought them to the very front as character comedians shine brightly through the comedy structure of the production. "They don't clown and they are not dressed in ludicrous fashion. They are real characters, and such characters!" Beery has the part of a dumb detective whose heart is right but whose mind is just a few hours behind him. Hatton has a dual role. First he is a wise-cracking newspaper reporter and then he is "Katie" Reagan, an underworld gang leader.

One of the most amusing features of the plot centers about this resemblance between the reporter and the gang leader. Beery knocks the gangster cold thinking it is the reporter, who is his rival for the girl in the case.
Mary Brian Appealing
 Dainty little Mary Brian is that girl and the boys certainly can't be blamed for falling for her. She is her own appealing beautiful self in a good role, and that is as much praise as anyone could wish. William Powell again acquires himself creditably as an arch villain in the role of an underworld gang leader and Jack Lunden shows why he is considered to have a promising future in his excellent characterization of the young assistant district attorney who declares war on the underworld gangs.

Rin-Tin-Tin Is Race Track Hero In Film

Again Rin-Tin-Tin, everybody's dog, sets the house in an uproar. One of the amusing things about this wise canine is the fact that he never seems camera-conscious. He is as oblivious to an audience as though it were non-existent. And the story seems to possess him as fully as if he were a human star. "A Race For Life," which is the attraction at the Star theater today and Saturday, if we reckon correctly, is the funniest film masterpiece, and it is, if possible, more filled with savage zest than any of its predecessors.
 The wonder dog is first seen with his pal, Danny O'Shea, aboard a box car making the trip South, where Danny expects to get in touch with some race horse owner who may give him the chance he wants—that is, to become a jockey. Though there is some excitement when the train-master discovers the two just as they reach the race tracks, it is here that the lovely Miss Calhoun saves them from dis-

aster and induces her sweetheart, Bob Hammond, to assign Danny to Black Halder in the season's big suspense play.
 Now comes menace in the person of Morgan, a rival owner, who attempts to disable the horse. Rinty, always on the lookout, attacks the man who temporarily blinds the dog, at the same time shouting that Rinty has come mad and is attacking the horses. Danny hides his frantic pal, but before the day of the big race Morgan kidnaps Danny. On the day of all days, Rinty manages to escape from his shack, and rushing to Danny sets him free. Leaving Rinty behind, Danny hastens to the tracks and is soon driving like mad—but—
 It is here that the breath-taking climax of the race for life whisks the house to a cheering, hand-clapping, whistling frenzy. You should not miss seeing Rin-Tin-Tin in "A Race for Life." It is his best, and you know what that means.
