PRICES SOAR IN STOCK EXCHANGE

Closing Strong with Leaders at High Level—4,200,000 Shares

NEW YORK, Apr. 27 (AP)—Gentle speculation for the advance on the New York stock exchange today sent prices of active issues soaring \$2 to nearly \$15 a share and completely swamped the machinery of the exchange. Orders piled onto the floor from all sections of the country in such tremendous volume that the ticker fell 40 minutes behind the market by early afternoon when the oils, changing hands in blocks of 5000 to 32,000 shares, assumed the leadership of the advance.

Consolidated Gas extended its early gain to nearly 10 points by touching a new high record at 125 1/2. Atlas Chemicals advanced more than 7 points to a new top at 129 1/2. Brooklyn Edison, Case Threshing, Jersey Central, International Harvester and American International advanced 5 points or more, while gains of two to four points were distributed among several score issues.

The closing was strong. Recognized leaders such as Radio and General Motors and several other high priced stocks began to compete with the oils for popularity in the late afternoon when changing sentiment regarding monetary and business conditions stimulated buying. Radio, General Motors, American Express and Dupont gained 4 points or so and Case Threshing Machine advanced 10 points. Sales approximated 4,200,000 shares.

WOOL REPORT

BOSTON, Apr. 27 (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say:

"There is more business being done in the eastern seaboard markets though occasionally at slight concessions in prices. On the whole, the market appears very healthy. However, in the west prices are fully maintained with an advancing tendency on medium wools in the bright wool states.

"There is evidently a better demand in the goods market both for men's and women's wear lines. Government award of over half a million yards of 16-ounce melton cloth was helpful.

"The foreign markets kept fairly steady. Bradford is a bit more active. Primary markets are generally inactive.

"Molair is slow of sale but prices are firmly maintained everywhere, both here and abroad."

Wheat Firm And Four Cents Up In Chicago Mart

CHICAGO, Apr. 27 (AP)—Opening at 1/2 to 2c gain, Chicago wheat reacted somewhat, but soon rallied. Corn and oats symmetrical with wheat, but only to a limited extent, corn starting at 1/2c off to 3/4c up, and temporarily showing some setback all around. Provisions tended to sag.

Wheat closed firm, 3 1/2 to 4 1/2c net higher, corn 1/2 to 3/4c up, oats 1/2 to 1 1/2c advance and provisions varying from 5c decline to a rise of 12c.

Egg Prices Firm; Standard Extras Up Half a Cent

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 27 (AP)—Egg prices continued firm on local markets today with standard extras quoted a half cent higher at 25 1/2c. Although receipts have been liberal during the past week and indications point to continuance of the supply, dealers do not anticipate any substantial drops from present quotations as moving is under way generally, and with the prospect of a large export business of Pacific coast eggs to South America during the coming year, a good market is looked for throughout the season. Yesterday's receipts of eggs were 2,718 cases with average holdings reported at 25,718 cases.

The butter market remained firm with prices unchanged. Receipts of butter yesterday were 14,012 pounds with 25,718 pounds in storage, an increase of 5,576 pounds for the day.

Pork and beef prices continued firm on country dressed meat markets today with supplies moderate and movement large. Veal continued in over-supply and the market was decidedly drummy. Lamb moved well at steady prices with supplies ample to meet demand.

Outside of a weaker undertone in the broiler classes, poultry prices remained steady today. Shipments of broiler chickens have been increasing and commission men look for a slightly easier market early next week.

Movement of old potatoes to the local retail trade was fairly good with prices for netted gems ranging from \$1.50 to \$2.25 per sack, depending on grade and condition.

Ernest Laemmle Hurt In Accident

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal., Apr. 27 (AP)—Ernest A. Laemmle, motion picture director and nephew of Carl Laemmle, was in a serious condition at a hospital here early today, following an accident in which his automobile apparently had turned over several times.

Laemmle, who was unable to give an account of the affair, was found by Beverly Hills police last night, unconscious and pinned by the left arm under his automobile. The car was on the sidewalk.

Doctors at the hospital said his condition was "hopeful" but expressed fears that it might be necessary to amputate the young director's badly shattered left arm to save his life.

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
