THE GARDEN

DON'T LET SOIL BAKE

Conditions brought about by carelessness or ignorance sometimes produce a bad condition of the soil in the garden. It hardens and bakes into brick-like consistency in hot dry weather. One of the occurrences which tends to produce this condition, particularly if the soil contains clay, is hoeing or working it in wet weather. This tends to puddle it much as clay is puddled to make water-tight bottoms for ponds.

Do not work the soil until it is sufficiently dry to crumble readily. Soils that show this tendency need humus and enough vegetable material in the shape of well-rotted stable manure or compost must be incorporated as early as possible and for several years to overcome it. Soils that have been overworked so that the humus content has been burned out of them show a tendency to solidify and bake. Sandy soil which is inclined to be acid in nature also bakes badly until de-

laying vegetable matter has been incorporated in sufficient quantity to break up its cohesion. This is particularly true if there is a mixture of clay. Soils which are chiefly clay give the most trouble of all in baking into brick in hot, dry periods.

Keeping the surface soil stirred regularly and constantly is the best precaution against it. Soils rich in humus give little trouble. Those deficient in lime give the most trouble. Liming is necessary in these soils to assist in remedying their texture but it must be borne in mind that when lime is used there must be a compensating amount of humus or decaying vegetable matter returned to the soil to make up for the exhaustion caused by the lime which makes the plant food available for the roots in the soil and is quickly used up.

The moisture content of the soil has much to do with its texture. The stirring of the surface, establishing a dust mulch, helps to retain the moisture in the soil by preventing too rapid evaporation. The evaporation soon cures the surface if it is not stirred regularly.
