Dr. W. T. Milliken Will Speak Here Sunday Morning

State Director of Religious Education Will Occupy Pulpit of First Baptist Church.

Regular church services will be held in La Grande tomorrow in the various houses of worship. At the First Baptist church, which is now without a minister, Dr. W. T. Milliken, who is state director of religious education for the church, will be the speaker for the morning church service at 11 o'clock.

During the Sunday school hour at 9:45 o'clock Miss Louise Lundrup, state elementary director, will meet with the primary department and will conduct a model program for this department of the Sunday school. Both Dr. Milliken and Miss Lundrup will attend the meeting of the Baptist Young People's union, which will be held in the evening at 6:30 o'clock.

Dr. Milliken and Miss Lundrup are in La Grande conducting a religious leadership training institute, which opened Thursday at the Baptist church.

The Rev. L. D. Meggers, who has resigned as pastor of the Church of the Nazarene here, will deliver his last sermon as pastor of the church tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock. His subject will be "Finally Brethren Farewell," taken from 11 Corinthians 13:11.

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In the morning the Rev. Mr. Meggers will give a statistical report of the year, and will also give a summary of what has been accomplished in the church during the past three years that he has been pastor.

The first year a total of \$2400 was raised for the church and in the second the building program was started, about \$6700 being raised during that year. During the past year about \$5600 was added to the church treasury, a part of that amount being labor donated during the construction of the new church. When Mr. Meggers first came to La Grande the church was merely an organized body, and during the three-year period property has been purchased and the church constructed.

Membership Increases

Mr. Meggers has preached 240 services in La Grande and has made calls in 1200 different homes. The church membership has been tripled during the three years. Rules of the Nazarene church are more rigid than those of many of the churches and for this reason the increase in membership is particularly outstanding.

Mr. and Mrs. Meggers will leave La Grande for Nampa, Ida., where they will attend the annual district assembly of the Nazarene church from May 2 to 6. They will also attend the general assembly in Columbus, Ohio and will then return to go to Eastern Washington, where Mr. Meggers has accepted a pastorate.

Delegates from the local church who will attend the district assembly are Mrs. Lester Long and Floyd Moore, and Sunday school superintendent, Lester Long, and young people's president, Roscoe Jordan.

The Rev. Guy Sharp, of Buhl, Ida., will take over the pastorate here and will arrive in La Grande at the close of the Nampa assembly, conducting his first services here May 13.

Association Will Meet Here Monday

American Judge Resigns Post In Geneva Tribunal

GENEVA, Apr. 28. (AP)—John Bassett Moore, American judge on the permanent court of international justice since 1921, announced his resignation today.

The resignation opened up the entire question of America's relation to the court and whether the United States would finally join it. Some circles believed that the election of an American as a successor to Mr. Moore was likely to depend largely on whether the United States resumed negotiations for membership.

Among the names mentioned as a successor were Charles Evans Hughes, Chief Justice Taft, Elliot Root, John W. Davis and George W. Wilkesman.

The election will be made by the next council of the league of nations and the assembly, both voting separately.

American nominations under the constitution of the court must be made by the American group of the old Hague court of arbitration which includes Mr. Moore, Mr. Root, Judge Gary and Oscar Straus. Mr. Moore in forwarding his letter of resignation to Sir Eric Drummond, secretary general of the league of nations, explained that he was withdrawing to devote his entire time to the completion of a mammoth treatise on international law. This will comprise 75 volumes.

Mr. Moore has spent 42 years on this work which deals with the history of arbitration and conciliation since the earliest times.

ULCER OF THE STOMACH

Member Gorgias Memorial A sore, similar in appearance to a cold sore, often seen on the lining of the stomach or within the adjoining small bowel (duodenum). This is a stomach ulcer. It is very likely to follow in the wake of other diseases such as pneumonia, typhoid, gonorrhea, and influenza. It may also be caused by alcoholic liquors, or by the use of excessive spices and other irritative foods.

Stomach ulcer generally comes on slowly and insidiously. The condition may become worse as time goes on or it may improve only to return more violently at a later date.

Pain in the pit of the stomach is most often the outstanding complaint. It may be associated with such other symptoms as heartburn, belching, nausea, vomiting, regurgitation, or even vomiting of blood. As a rule the distress comes on after eating, anywhere from a few minutes to hours after the food is taken, and may last from minutes

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to hours. At times it becomes most severe only during the night. Patients will often gain relief from the use of bicarbonate of soda but this is only temporary.

It is important that a correct diagnosis be made and that proper early treatment be instituted. All ulcer cases are not precisely the same. On the contrary, they differ in type and degree. Some cases may be treated in the office and others must be put to bed. Treatment in all cases should require a long period of time, and observation of the case should embrace years. Neglect in this direction will endanger the lives of ulcer sufferers.

The treatment will vary a great deal, depending upon the nature of the individual case. The forms of treatment are many. Mental and physical rest, as well as diet and medication, are a few of the more important. The final result, however, in most cases will depend upon the spirit of co-operation accomplished by the patient toward the doctor.

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
