DEL ALLEN WINS IN 40 SECONDS

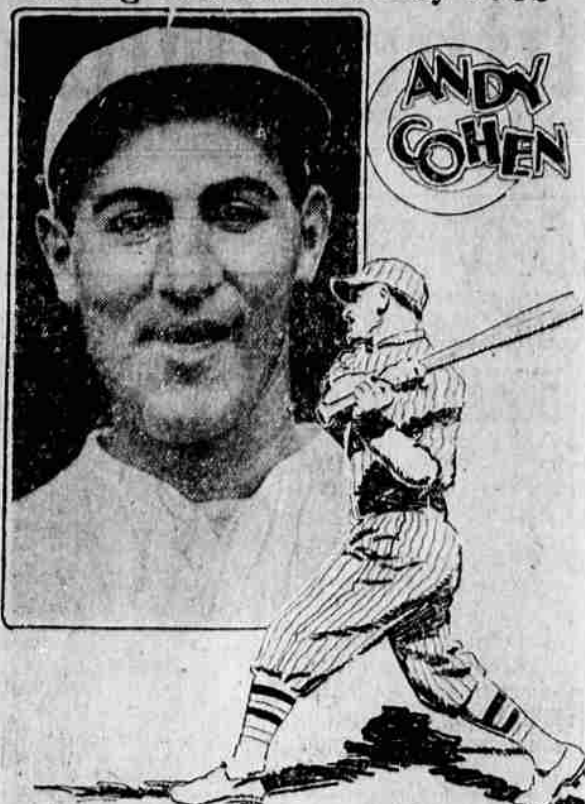
Smith of Spokane, Rocked to Sleep in First—Kermit Davis Gets Nod

Del Allen, La Grande fighter, boosted his prestige considerably here Saturday night when he added another one-round knockout to his list. This gives him 15 kayos in 37 battles. Fred Smith, of Spokane, lasted just 40 seconds, according to the timer, Dr. William Pearce. Smith and Allen met in the middle of the ring. Smith lead with a left, Allen countered. A moment later Allen tore into his opponent, and a broadside attack to Smith's head sent him to the canvas. Nearly two minutes after the referee, O. D. Scott, raised Allen's hand, Smith's handlers were still working on him with smelling salts. Bell Saves Duncan The rest of the fights on the evening card—held at Rex hall before a fair-sized crowd—went the limit, although Kermit Davis failed to get a knockout because of the bell. In the semi-final Davis took an early lead over Mickey Duncan, of Walla Walla, giving the Washington lad a boxing lesson. About the middle of the scrap Duncan braced and for a while it looked as if he would even things up. But Kermit would not be denied and in the sixth round he began working on the visitor in earnest. Duncan went to the floor for a count of seven shortly after the round started and just five seconds before the final bell, Davis smashed him to the floor again. A little while more and Davis' supporters are sure he would have had a knockout. Jack Lane, of Walla Walla, 125, won a decision over Kid Alabama of La Grande, 140, but not until the last of the four rounds. The Kid mixed it furiously during the first two rounds, but Lane's superior endurance and boxing ability brought him through. In the curtain raiser Russel Anderson, 112, and Glen Ford, 117, fought a snappy four-round bout. Anderson had a little the best of it in the first two rounds but Ford evened things up before the fight came to an end.

Bill Cissell Hits 12 Straight Games CHICAGO, Apr. 30 (AP)—When Bill Cissell, \$125,000 White Sox rookie short stop, doubled in yesterday's game with St. Louis, he ran his string of consecutive games in which he has hit safely to an even dozen. He is hitting over .300 so far and is second in that department on the White Sox lineup only to Hank Kammah.

DELANEY AND SHARKEY MEET THIS EVENING NEW YORK, Apr. 30 (AP)—Jack Delaney and Jack Sharkey fight 15 rounds or less at Madison Square Garden tonight. The Boston sailor man is an 8 to 5 favorite chiefly on account of the disappointing showing Delaney has made in the heavyweight class. The match brings together two of the ring's greatest mysteries. Once regarded as an eventual challenger to wear the mantle that now drapes about Gene Tunney's broad shoulders, Delaney lost prestige he will find hard to regain, in his losing battle with Tom Heeney, the rugged New Zealander, unless he flashes again the form that carried him to the last heavyweight throne. Delaney may find himself out of luck from any further opportunity of crashing into "the big money" among the heavyweights. Sharkey in much the same predicament as is his opponent. His draw battle with Heeney and the bout he lost to Johnny Risko apparently demonstrated that the symptoms of greatness discovered in him after he beat Harry Wills, Jimmy Maloney and others were symptoms and nothing more.

Making Good in Hornsby's Job



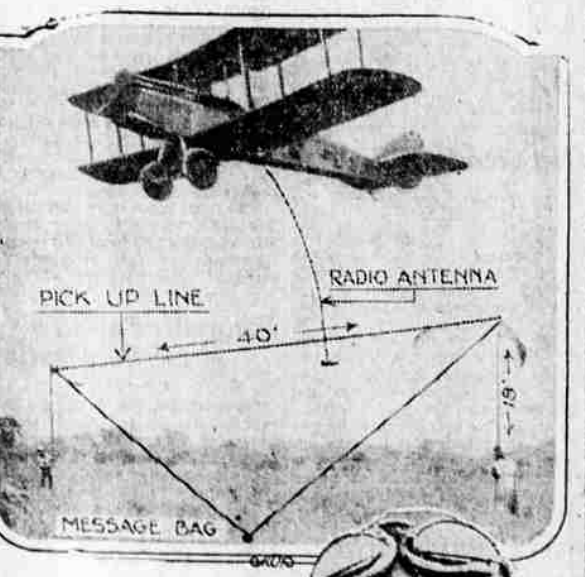

Although the flowers that bloom in the spring generally are withered beyond repair by fall, Wilbert Robinson's flock of hopefuls are not letting that interfere with their dreams so long as they can stay on top of the National League standing. Given pitching better than even Robby had a right to expect, the Robins took both ends of a double header with the Philadelphia Nationals at Ebbets field yesterday, 3-1 and 3-0. The New York Giants split a double header with the Boston Braves at the Polo grounds. The Braves fell on Virgil Barnes in the eighth inning of the first contest and hammered out a five to 3 victory. The Giants pounded three pitchers for 15 hits to take the closing battles, 12 to 8.

Cubs Win in 12 Inning At Chicago, the Cubs turned on the St. Louis Cardinals and squeezed out a 5 to 3 verdict in 12 innings. Heathcote scoring the winning run on Mike Gonzales' single. Grover Cleveland Alexander started for the Cardinals but found the going too tough as early as the second inning. Charlie Root held the nover to one hit in the last four innings and was credited with his first victory of the season.
