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Injunction Case Testimony Heard In Circuit Court

A large representation of the populace of Elgin assembled in the court room this morning when a suit for an injunction, the case of Dwight Barnes et al vs. Scott Harris et al, was commenced before Judge J. W. Knowles in equity court. The case has attracted attention throughout the Elgin community because of its civic interest. The plaintiffs are seeking an injunction to stop the issuance of bonds by the Elgin school district for the building of a new auditorium, bonds of which were voted at a meeting last winter. The plaintiffs claim that the election notice wasn't a legal notice and that the meeting was not conducted in regular manner, and that a standing vote was taken. They claim to have protested at the time. A large number of Elgin High school students were among the listeners in court this morning. The proposed auditorium includes a gymnasium. Plaintiff's testimony had not been quite completed at noon today, after about half a dozen had appeared on the witness stand.

Lindbergh Takes Famous Airplane On Last Flight

ST. LOUIS, Apr. 30. (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh took the "Spirit of St. Louis" on its last flight today. He left Lambert-St. Louis field at 9 a. m., for Washington where the ocean-spanning monoplane will be placed in the Smithsonian institution for exhibit with other history making airplanes.
The termination of the South American good will tour Feb. 19 brought the "Spirit of St. Louis" to rest in a national guard hangar here where it has been kept under guard. The announcement last night by Col. Lindbergh, brought a tinge of regret to St. Louisans. They were loath to take leave of the plane to which they had attached an affection and which had carried the name of their city to many climes and to many peoples.
Colonel Lindbergh himself, spoke with an accent of pride as he told of the miles the single motored plane had traversed without failing.
"The Spirit has flown slightly more than 40,000 miles," he said. "It has been inspected several times and nothing materially wrong has been found. It is apparently in perfect mechanical condition.
