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Bridge Pointers

Yesterday's problem was: Contract, Spades; South Dealer, North Dummy; the initial lead is shown. How should Declarer operate his twenty-six cards?

WEST LEADS SOUTH DUMMY EAST PLAYS

♠ J-8-7
♥ 5-4-3
♦ A-8-5-4
♣ A-10-6-2

♠ A-10-6-2
♥ K-Q-J
♦ K-7-6-2
♣ 7

Declarer can see that he stands to lose one Heart and two Diamonds, also one Spade if the finesse be wrong. Of course he will win the first Club in Dummy and then the natural play would be to try the trump finesse. At first glance it would not seem that there was going to be any need for Dummy to trump Hearts and it looks like a fine opportunity to lead trumps from Dummy. A little thought, however, shows that trump lead affords a fine opportunity to lose game if the King of Spades should be in West's hand; and West, winning with it, should lead a Diamond.

However, there is a simple play in the hand which practically insures game instead of making it only a chance. Here it is: Trick 2, lead the singleton Heart from Dummy; if that be won by an adversary and another Club or a Diamond led, Closed Hand would win the trick and lead two winning Hearts on which Dummy would discard two losing Diamonds. Closed Hand then would play a cross-ruffing game which might produce a Small Slam, and which very probably would produce five-odd.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1. (AP)—With the outcome of nation wide scope and a spirited campaign and fair weather promising a heavy vote, California voters today cast their ballots in the presidential primary for three democratic candidates, and a prohibitionist.

The three sided democratic contest was between Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York; Senator James A. Reed of Missouri and Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana.

To the victor, political forecasters declared, may go the nomination at Houston in June.

Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, did not have an opponent for his party's 29 delegates, and Daniel A. Polling of New York,
