SIX CHAMPIONS TO DEFEND BELT

Loughran, Tunney, Walker, Mandell and Canzoneri to Fight

By P. C. Vosburgh (Feature Service Sports Editor) NEW YORK (AP)—Gene Tunney isn't the only world's champion who is to defend his crown this summer.

Not less than six champions in the eight recognized and bona fide weight divisions already are booked for championship fights, and it looks like fireworks ahead.

Tommy Loughran, the light heavyweight ruler, has agreed to take on a challenger June 7 at the Yankee Stadium, also for Tex Rickard, his opponent probably to be Leo Lomax or Jimmy Slattery.

Mickey Walker, middleweight champion, who is handled by Jack Kearns and hence is unavailable to Rickard, is to tackle Ace Hickins in Chicago in June or July under the auspices of Jim Mullen, Rickard's Windy City rival.

Joe Dundee, welterweight titleholder, has been signed by Jess McMahon, matchmaker unto Rickard, for a Polo Grounds scrap June 21.

But Hickins' growth into the middleweight division has robbed the Baltimore Italian of his challenger. Another one now must be named, possibly the hardy Sergeant Sammy Baker, who has given the Ace some memorable battles.

Sammy Mandell, the somewhat evasive, but none the less respected lightweight champion, is booked for a scrap May 17 at the Polo Grounds that runs second only to the heavyweight championship match in its appeal to the popular imagination.

Interest in the fight is due in large part to the colorful personality and dynamic punching power of little Jimmy McLarnin, "the baby-faced rattle-snake," the challenger and man of the hour in the lightweight class.

Down among the featherweights Tony Canzoneri, the spunky New York Italian who losses the division in his own right now that he has beaten Benny Bass, is to take on that hard-hitting atom from Milwaukee, Joe Sangor, the same who kayaked gallant little Bud Taylor.

With these six, all of whom are due to see action in the next few weeks, the list of recognized and undepicted champions ends. The game Bud Tunney, who, going before Sangor, is considered a lightweight champion by some states, but is not universally acclaimed. Bud has about outgrown the division anyway. The flyweight class has two champions instead of one, and it is possible that Rickard will get them together this month in another of those "champion vs. champion" things. Corporal Izzy Schwartz is recognized by the New York State boxing commission and Frankie Genaro, former champion, by the National Boxing association.

There's a championship fight in prospect also in that somewhat synthetic class, the junior light weight, Ted Morgan, who rules that roost, is to defend it against cannonball Eddie Martin May 24 in what probably will be the last indoor fight of the season at Madison Square Garden.

Dr. Otto Peltzer Injures Ankle At Wickersdorf

WICKERSDORF, Germany, May 2 (AP)—Dr. Otto Peltzer, German runner, has injured an ankle. He has been one of Germany's greatest hopes for success in the Olympic games.

Peltzer injured his right ankle when he was taking part in a field day at Wickersdorf on Sunday. He was playing hand ball and fell in a general scuffle.

The attending physician feared that weeks may elapse before the runner will be able to resume training and he may then be too late for him to get in condition for the games at Amsterdam.

The 25-year-old foot runner ace, Dr. Peltzer, is the holder of three official world records, the most noteworthy of which is his outdoor mark of 1:51 3-5 for the half mile. The others are 5:00 and 8:00 meters.

If the galling German's injury keeps him out of the Olympics it will blast his greatest ambition, which was to win the 500-meter title in a race in which his prospective opponents would include Lloyd Hahn, the American star and Douglas Lowe, of England, the present Olympic champion.

TRAIN FOR MARATHON SAN FRANCISCO, May 2 (AP)—At least a dozen runners are training for the Redwood highway marathon from San Francisco to Grants Pass, Ore. It starts June 14.

Mad Bull, last year's winner, and his running mate, Flying Cloud, who came in second, are reeling off a few miles daily at Eugene, Ore., under William "Bill" Hayward, track coach at the University of Oregon.
