A frost, heavier in some parts of the county than in others, followed a clearing up of the skies last night, and some reports of damage were received today by farmers.

North Powder reports a fairly heavy frost, with the temperature below freezing point. One Cove farmer reported considerable damage to the Ichleria autumnum pinnatifida, his cherries, and the Grand main reports a quarter of an inch of ice in a bucket of water in his back yard.

Fred Terpany reports that fruit trees around Elgin are not in bloom yet and that around Imbler only the earlier varieties are starting to bloom. There was practically no frost in the north end of the county. Over the valley as a whole, no apple trees are blossoming, only the cherry and apricot trees coming into bloom yet.

In La Grande the frost was very light, it is reported. The minimum temperature last night was 31 above. Dampness prevented a more serious frost in this locality.

FROST IN COOS BAY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 2. (AP)—The Coos Bay region had a light frost this morning when the mercury dropped to 32 degrees for a few hours. The lowlands were blanketed in white. No damage to the fruit crop was seen.

CALIFORNIA VOTES SMITH AND HOOVER

nia have turned from prohibition fanaticism back to the fundamental principles of democracy."

Walsh campaign headquarters concede the victory to Smith but declared that the defeat of their candidate in California would in no way detract from his popularity with the people of his strength with the democratic party.

San Francisco voted to issue \$24,000,000 in bonds to complete the Hetch Hetchy water project which will bring water to the city from the Tuolumne river. The city also voted to issue \$11,000,000 in bonds to purchase the Spring Valley water company, which now supplies the municipality. Los Angeles rejected a proposal to issue \$6,000,000 in bonds and purchase three airports there.

SMITH, HOOVER LEAD FIELD

WASHINGTON, May 2. (AP)—By his sweeping victory in the California presidential primaries, Gov. Alfred E. Smith has passed his first big test of strength in the race for the nomination at the Houston convention.

Herbert Hoover, who, like the New York executive, is showing his heels to his opponents in the fight for the republican nomination at Kansas City, has further advanced his lead by winning the 29 delegates in his home state, and stimulated the hopes of his supporters by polling a tremendous vote.

In bagging California's 26 convention votes Smith brought his claimed delegate total to 494, or 29 1/2 short of the two thirds necessary to nominate. His claims to 70, however, are disputed. The balloting brought the total democratic delegates elected this far to 670, or 63 1/2 less than the two-thirds majority and leaves 420 to be chosen, with Virginia's convention, the last on the calendar, set for June 21.

The 29 Hoover gained boosted his total claimed delegates to 396, or 149 less than the required majority of 545. His claims to 158 delegates are disputed. His nearest opponent, Lowden, claims 239, of which 66 are not conceded by his opponents.

Republican delegates selected to date number 247, with 234 to be chosen, the last being the 19 in West Virginia May 29 when Hoover and Senator Goff of that state, fight it out in the primary. The same three candidates that opposed each other yesterday in California, will be pitted against each other in the Oregon primaries May 18, while Smith and Reed are entered in the West Virginia primaries May 29.

In addition to going into the Kansas City convention with the solid support of California's 29 votes, Hoover's supporters hope to line up Washington's 37 on Thursday and Oregon's 13 on May 18. This would give him an impressive block of delegates from the west coast states.

MEADDO REBUFFED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2. (AP)—William Gibbs Mead, former secretary of the treasury and a leader of the dry forces in California, will not go to the Houston democratic convention in June as a delegate, as a result of the presidential preference primary in this state yesterday.

QUERIES DANIELS

LOS ANGELES, May 2. (AP)—Wilbur Leggett, state campaign manager for Senator James A. Reed's presidential race, today telegraphed Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy under President Wilson, asking him if he would run for vice president on a ticket headed by Reed or Senator Borah if Gov. Al Smith of New York is nominated at the Houston democratic convention.

SHIRNERS ELECT WEBSTER

MIAMI, Fla., May 2. (AP)—Clyde I. Webster of Modern Temple, Detroit today was elected imperial outer guard of the Ancient Arabic order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. This shrine post leads eventually by routine advancement yearly to the highest office. By the regular course of promotion he will become imperial potentate in 1942.

ment the tumultuous welcome they were given in New York City.

Their greeting at Bolling field, where the formal exercises were held, was enthusiastic and impressive.

The three fliers—von Huenefeld, Fitzmaurice and Koehl, were met at the aviation field by Major Howard Davidson, the commandant, and they made their appearance before the crowds to the accompaniment of music and salutes.

Prominent among those who participated in the welcoming ceremonies was Charles A. Lindbergh, who sat in a box with Eddie Rickenbacker, the American world war ace, who during the war was captured and perhaps was at some time opposed to Captain Koehl in active combat. Lindbergh was hatless and wore a plain business suit in contrast to the formal attire of the dignitaries in formal dress and the army uniforms that surrounded him.

After the Bremen trio had been received officially by Assistant Secretary MacCracken, of the commerce department, led Lindbergh and Rickenbacker forward from the cabinet box to greet their colleagues of the air.

Lindbergh spoke very briefly to the visiting aviators, conveying to them his congratulations for their feat. Huenefeld then said he considered Lindbergh "the greatest flier in the world."

With the brief ceremony ended the latest transatlantic aviators left the field to the strains of the national anthems of their home lands. Later in the day they will receive from President Coolidge the distinguished flying crosses awarded to them by congress.

WOMAN TO TRY IT

BERLIN, May 2. (AP)—The pilot of Lufthansa's Viennese actress and her pilot, Johann Rattler, for a flight across the Atlantic in the Junkers plane Europa advanced another step today with the departure for Baldonnel, Ireland, of the same engineer and mechanics who put the Bremen in shape for the successful adventure of Baron von Huenefeld and his companions.

An Ireland-bound ship also carried the necessary benzol and oil for the Europa.
