Ritner Favors Construction Of Rapids Project

PENDLETON, May 2—Roy W. Ritner of Umatilla county, republican candidate for congress in the second district for the vacancy made by the resignation of N. J. Sinnott, has been a resident of Eastern Oregon for over 45 years. Mr. Ritner is a former member of the house of representatives, having been elected in 1914 and re-elected in 1916. In 1918 he was elected to the state senate and was re-elected in 1922. In 1921 he was president of the senate.

While in the legislature he was active in road legislation, being a member of the roads and highways committee which at the 1927 session drafted the present highway program.

Mr. Ritner, the son of pioneer parents, was educated in Pendleton public schools and at Weston Normal. He worked in the old Pendleton Savings bank for ten years. In 1908 he gave up banking for farming and has been raising wheat ever since. During the war he was with the Red Cross overseas with a rank of captain.

Mr. Ritner favors construction of the Umatilla Rapids project, complete development of federal irrigation projects authorized by congress on a basis of fair play; adequate care, hospitalization and compensation to veterans of the late and previous wars; reimbursement by the federal government to various counties for loss of taxes from lands held in forest reserves, Indian reservations and land grants; a tariff on wool, wheat, timber products and other commodities raised in quantities in Oregon.

Cle Elmu Man
Is New Head of Baker Schools

BAKER, Ore., May 2—Hugh Coleman, for the past six years superintendent of schools at Cle Elum, Washington, has been elected to a similar position in the Baker city schools by the board of education. Frank C. McCulloch, district clerk, has announced.

Mr. Coleman, who was chosen from a field of 51 applicants, has held his present position six years. He was selected at a larger salary than he will receive here, but consented to make the change in order to get into a larger system. Mr. Coleman has won widespread prestige in Washington educational circles by his ability to organize a smooth-running system and to build up a corps of strong teachers.

RUBBER HOSE RIVALS

WASHINGTON (AP)—Nearly half the world's export trade in rubber hose is supplied by the United States, the department of commerce reports. Great Britain is the biggest buyer, Australia second and Mexico third. Germany is the largest competitor of the United States, which last year sold 7,117,943 pounds of rubber hose worth \$2,670,839. Total world export trade was 16,226,431 pounds worth \$4,707,592.

AT THE THEATERS

Adolphe Menjou Lauded In Latest Picture

This city has enjoyed "Gentlemen of Paris," "Serenade" and other Adolphe Menjou starring productions, but his latest, "A Night of Mystery," is hailed as being greater than any of his previous efforts.

"A Night of Mystery" is being shown at the Arcade theater today and Thursday and according to reports is one of the best pictures of the season.

The production is Ernest Vajda's adaptation of Victorien Sardou's stage play, "Captain Ferrol," and presents Menjou as the handsome and jashing captain of the French-African Chasseurs, who becomes involved in a killing as a result of a love tryst with a married woman.

Ferrol's lips are sealed as to the name of the actual murderer, for the latter threatened to tell of his heart affairs if he hurls any accusations. The story reaches a tremendous climax when the brother of the girl Ferrol loves is tried for the murder another committed, and Ferrol is made to furnish a supply for the average family to be dug as wished and with their full supply quality intact. This does not remain after they have been dug for any length of time. The parsnip is a most obliging vegetable, requiring a minimum of care. It may be harvested at times when there is nothing else to be taken from the garden, in the early winter months and early spring months, as it requires a freeze to bring out its sunny quality.

Parsnips require rich soil and a deep soil, but fresh manure should not be incorporated where they are to grow as it results in deformed and forked roots instead of the uniform tapering root that is desired. Saw thinly and thin to six inches apart in the row. The rest of the work consists merely of cultivation and keeping down the weeds. The parsnips will perform even if the needs do overgrow them and produce edible roots, although not of the size and quality that would result if they were given a full chance to develop.

It is a long season plant and should be planted as soon as the soil can be worked. While the fall crop is excellent it is never quite so good as when the roots are dug during a thaw in February or March. In addition to being eaten as a vegetable by itself, it is achieving an importance as a flavoring vegetable in soups and stews and is an important culinary adjunct.

The old style long-rooted parsnips required a rich, deep soil to do their best but a newer type of intermediate length has been developed that does not require the
