

AIRPLANES BOMB SHANGHAI TODAY

Four Explosive Charges Dropped—Learn Story of Murder of Seymour

SHANGHAI, May 3 (AP)—Two planes, one of them a seaplane, flew over Shanghai today and dropped four bombs. They exploded in the vicinity of the Shanghai station and among the nationalistic warships anchored off the Kiangnan arsenal. Two women and two cows were injured.

The planes were believed to be from the northern cruiser Haiich which was off Woosung.

Their flight over the international settlement caused a great commotion. They returned unscathed.

RHANGHAI, May 3 (AP)—Five northern soldiers killed Dr. Walter P. Seymour, Presbyterian missionary at Taining, as he sought to close the gates of the mission against their intrusion according to the story told here today by his widow and C. K. James, another missionary.

Mrs. Seymour and Mr. James arrived in Shanghai today after a two days trip atop a box car from Taining. James said that after Seymour had fallen the soldiers succeeded in unbaring the heavy wooden gates and entered the compound. They robbed the body and departed.

Dr. Seymour was buried the following day, April 17, in the mission cemetery while a battle was still in progress.

Prior to the nationalist departure for the north their commander expressed his regrets to Mrs. Seymour over the occurrence but the two said today, made little effort to punish the murderers.

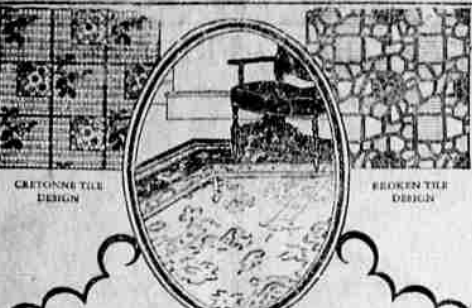
COVE PERSONALS

S. E. Notson In Oregon Politics Nearly 25 Years

HEPPNER, Ore., May 3.—S. E. Notson, of Heppner, Morrow county, has definitely declared himself as a candidate for nomination to the office of representative in congress from the second Oregon district, to succeed N. J. Sinnott of The Dalles, who has been given an appointment by President Coolidge as judge of the United States court of claims. Mr. Notson will make an active campaign for the nomination and while he is doing this he will urge all republicans to turn out to the primaries, and if possible, prevail upon them to cast a vote for him by writing in his name on the ballot.

Mr. Notson has been active in republican politics of Oregon during the greater part of the 25 years he has resided in Morrow county. He was born and reared on a farm and is familiar with the farmers' problems; he was twice a delegate to the Oregon irrigation congress and is familiar with this problem; he favors strongly the Umatilla Rapids project. In politics he has served Morrow county for 8 1/2 years as county school superintendent and

has been elected three times as district attorney without opposition, and his standing in the home county is high as an official and citizen.

As to his war record, he had two sons in service in France, and his personal contribution consisted of service as county food administrator, member of the council of defense, member of advisory board, member of executive committee of Red Cross chapter, and speaker in every war drive, giving his time ungrudgingly day and night during that period in which his county was engaged in the terrible struggle.
