Warsaw Casualty
List Is Up to 200

WARSAW, Poland, May 3 (AP)—An investigation today of ambulance stations and hospitals revealed that more than 200 persons were injured in May day fighting between the socialists and communists. More than 40 of those injured had bullet wounds.

Police have arrested more than 200 persons. 815 persons were killed during the conflicts and an investigation into these shootings is being made. Those found to be involved will be tried for murder.
