Four games in the American league found the Atlantic seaboard triumphant in every instance. The west got what consolation it could out of an even split in two east-west contests in the national league. Babe Gets Homer Babe Ruth's big bat and Herb Pennock's effective pitching enabled the New York Yankees to crush Chicago White Sox at New York 10 to 4. The Sultan of Swat went to bat four times, and pounded out his sixth homer of the season. Joe Dugan came to bat in the first inning with the bases full and promptly cleaned them with a four base drive into the bleachers.

Senators Hammer Browns At Washington the Senator hammered five St. Louis Brown pitchers for 13 hits and carried off a 3 to 4 decision. Denny McFayden outpitched Willie Hudd in Boston and the Red Sox nosed out the Cleveland Indians, 3 to 2, in the only game of the day in which the winning team failed to score 10 or more runs.

The New York Giants added another win for the east in a National league encounter at Cincinnati where they howled over the Reds, 11 to 7. At Forbes field, the Pittsburgh Pirates recorded the west's sole triumph with the Boston Braves as the victims, 13 to 3. Rain prevented hostilities between the Brooklyn Dodgers and Cardinals at St. Louis and the Phillies and Cubs at Chicago.
