TIGERS NOSE
OUT MAC-HI
BY 2 POINTSLa Grande Wins Fourth
Straight East Oregon
Track MeetANSON SETS NEW
RECORD IN MILESuperiority in the Field
Events Saves Blue and
White Colors from
Northern Onslaught.

Nosing out Milton-Preswater by two points, the La Grande Tigers won their first championship in a year's competition at Union Saturday, taking their fourth consecutive Eastern Oregon track and field meet.

The final score in points follows: La Grande 54½, Milton-Preswater 54½, Baker 35, Pendleton 35, Prairie City 12, Union 11, Wallawa 4.

La Grande scored in every event from Anson's half point in the pole vault to 10 points in the discus, made by Charlton, Biling and Keffler. In the track events both Mac-Hi and the Buckaroos were slightly superior but in the field events, La Grande scored four more points than its nearest rival.

Huffed High Point Man

Huffed, the Mac-Hi ace who runs wild on the gridiron and eagles on the maple court, demonstrated his versatility by winning high point honors with 15 points—one first, one second and two thirds.

But, with all due respect to Huffed, the real heroes of the meet are two La Grande boys—Anson, crack distance man, and young Taylor, who surprised the spectators and himself by tossing the spear 156 feet and more to win first place. Everybody expected Charlton to take this event but his teammate saved the day for La Grande by flashing championship form where it was most needed.

Anson Breaks Mile Record

Anson's feat in the distance will be long remembered. He, one of the two men on the field capable of winning two blue ribbons, and he was the only man who was able to put any of the Eastern Oregon records into the discard. In the mile run, he flashed around the track in 4:45, just five seconds faster than the record set in 1912 by Payne, of Athens. The record was approved by A. A. U. officials. In the half mile he showed his heels to the rest of the pack, but Dr. Pearce's 2:08 still stands after 18 years of endeavor.

Tiger hopes were rather gloomy about the middle of the afternoon, with the score-board reading "La Grande, 23½, Milton-Preswater 25½." Early in the afternoon La Grande was in fourth place in points, and it was an uphill fight until the discus and javelin came on. In the discus the Tigers cut a Mac-Hi lead of nine points to a bare three, and in the javelin La Grande forged ahead four points, clinching the meet. The Tiger crew of Keffler, Price, Conley and Syge only placed fourth in the relay but that was enough to win.

Rough Track and Wind

The day was ideal for the meet except for two things—the roughness of the track and the incessant wind. Pole vaulters, sprinters and broadjumpers had to contend against a stiff breeze, and the marks made were much higher than otherwise. The century was run in more than 11 seconds, some-

ROBBER SHOT
TO DEATH BY
POLICEMENSlaying Follows Holdup in
New California Theater
in San Diego, Cal.MOVIE MANAGER
DIES OF WOUNDSMotorcycle Patrolman Is
Shot in Shoulder in At-
tempt to Stop Bandits
in Speeding Car.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 7 (AP)—Joy Malloy, assistant manager of the New California theater in this city, one of the West Coast chain, was fatally wounded last night when shot by a holdup man in his office on the mezzanine floor of the theater. He died in less than an hour after the shooting. The bandit immediately backed out of the office, covering two other theater employees with his revolver and escaped in an automobile in which a confederate was waiting near the entrance.

In an adjoining district three miles north from the theater, Archie Comstock and Thomas Hamilton, motorcycle patrolmen, had just received notice of the holdup when they recognized the bandit car speeding by and started in pursuit. When Comstock pulled up to it some one inside shot him through the shoulder. Remington shot into the car and stopped with Comstock.

Dies of Wounds

Details of police in pursuit found the car abandoned near a canyon and began a close search on both sides. Detective Hugh Rochford with Deputy Sheriff B. Mason and Patrolman Chaveaux entered an apartment house basement on the bank. They saw a man crouched in a dark corner and opened fire, shooting him five times. He died soon afterward. An envelope in his pocket bore the name of O. P. Morrissey, with a local apartment house address.

The abandoned car bore a number registered to Bert Bean of San Pedro as owner. A blood stained car in the car indicated that the other bandit was probably also wounded.

AMERICANS SAFE
IN TSINAN, WORDAtmosphere There Tense
But Quiet—Japs Plan
To Hold Shantung

TSINGTAI, May 7 (AP)—Today's dispatches from Tsinan said while the atmosphere there was tense, it was quiet.

The northerners have been bombing Tsinan sporadically and one of their planes crashed yesterday, killing its occupants.

AMERICANS SAFE

SHANGHAI, May 7 (AP)—H. J. Timperley, an Australian newspaper correspondent in Tsinan, who had been in Tsinan since the Japanese invasion, has arrived in Tsingtao, and wired that all Americans in Tsinan were safe in the Japanese area.

Stein's hotel, a foreign hotel in which Timperley stayed, was looted. The correspondent stated the situation was growing quiet, the nationalists having withdrawn except some isolated snipers which the Japanese are cleaning out.

JAPS MAY HOLD PROVINCE

TOKYO, May 7 (AP)—The general staff and other high war and navy officials propose that Japan may hold Shantung province and its railways until present difficulties over Tsinan are solved. It was also proposed that the fighting factions of the Chinese be ordered to cease Japanese in Shantung.

It was stated that sanction of the cabinet will be sought for the sending of all infantry units, including the divisional headquarters of the Nagoya division to Tsingtao, Shantung, to administer the railway. The sending of five additional companies of infantry to Tientsin also was urged.

With the general staff plans under consideration by the cabinet and a favorable decision expected, the navy department decided to send additional ships to various Chinese ports.

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Prince Carol Is
Ready To Return
When Call ComesGives His Ideas for the
"Future Government of
Rumania;" British Stop
Flight.

GODSTONE, Surrey, England, May 7 (AP)—Prince Carol of Rumania, now visiting with a fellow countryman here, told the Associated Press today that while he had no special plan or time for his return to Rumania, he would respond "when called."

The prince said that the manifesto under his signature which appeared in print this morning stating that he was ready to return to Rumania if the call should come, was a correct statement of his views of the Rumanian situation.

Referring to reforms mentioned in the manifesto to such as free elections, the freedom of the press, separation of the army and judiciary from politics, abolition of monopolies and aid for the peasants, Prince Carol said:

"I have no connection whatever with any political party in Rumania," he said. "I merely took the opportunity of the peasants' party meeting in Alba Julia for the issuance of the manifesto in order to avoid possible bloodshed among my people."

The prince denied, however, any knowledge of two airplanes he is supposed to have ordered for carrying the manifesto to Rumania. "I know nothing of the manner of its distribution," he said.

Asked whether he had any idea of making a trip to the United States, as has been reported, Carol replied that it was quite possible that he might if his Rumanian plans did not materialize.

PREVENTS FLIGHT

LONDON, May 7 (AP)—The press association states that the British authorities, learning Saturday that two Imperial airway machines had been chartered, ostensibly to fly with Prince Carol to Rumania, took action to prevent the flight.

The reason given for this by the press association was that the British authorities were not satisfied that Carol possessed the necessary papers to land in Rumania.

REFUSE DEMAND

BUCHAREST, May 7 (AP)—The Romanian today refused the demand by 200,000 peasants meeting at Alba Julia yesterday that the government of Vintila Bratianu resign.

Julio Maniu, leader of the peasants who brought the demand to Bucharest was informed that the regency saw no occasion for demanding the resignation.

In the face of a negative reply the peasant party may now adopt passive resistance toward the present government including the non-payment of taxes in order to embarrass it.

One by one, the candidates showed up in the committee room, each being made the target of good natured joking remarks by the members of the committee, especially when the candidate happened to be a member of the senate.

Chairman Steiwer said the committee proposed to make an "impartial" investigation.

"We will conduct our inquiry in such a way as to elicit the truth, but without inquiring or aiding any candidate," he said.

NORRIS EXPENSES \$6

Senator Norris asked to be heard first because of a committee meeting. He was sworn and Steiwer asked him to tell of expenditures of his campaign and the scope of it. Norris was smoking a pipe.

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Dirigible Ends
Trip Over Sea
To Spitzbergen

KINGSBAY, Spitzbergen May 7 (AP)—The dirigible Italia was safe at her base today awaiting favorable weather conditions for a final expedition to make a series of trips over unexplored wastes of the arctic and to the north pole itself.

Despite extremely unfavorable weather conditions, General Umberto Nobile brought the airship from Vadsø, Norway, some 700 miles across the Arctic ocean to Kings Bay in sixteen and a half hours and made her fast to the mooring mast of the base ship Città di Milano. A high wind was blowing and the dirigible was forced to stay anchored to the ship for many hours since it was impossible to put her in the hangar used by the Norge when general Nobile flew from here over the north pole in 1926.
