## Yankees Defeat White Sox, 4-2; Giants Beaten

Sixty thousand persons, including the famous crew of the Bremen, watched the New York Yankees subdue the Chicago White Sox for the third day in a row, 4 to 2, at the Yankee Stadium. In the closing encounter, Babe Herman's four base drive with a man on base in the eighth enabled the Robins to win a 3-0 decision.

## Texas Harmony Democrats Win Initial Skirmish

DALLAS, Tex., May 7 (AP)—Texas "harmony" democrats have emerged from the opening skirmish with other factions of the party, strongly favored to win their campaign for a delegation to the national convention announced for or against any presidential candidate. After a drive led by the youthful governor, Dan Moody, the "harmony" faction Saturday demonstrated its strength in precinct conventions by obtaining control of 71 of the 254 counties that leaders of opposing factions made little effort to secure complete returns. The Moody forces demanded a declaration unreservedly for presidential candidates but instructed to work for a dry plank in the national party platform.

Landing on the field here last night, after a hop over to Mitchell field, Lindbergh narrowly averted a tragedy as 2,000 people swarmed out onto the field, in imminent danger from the whipping blades of his plane's propeller.

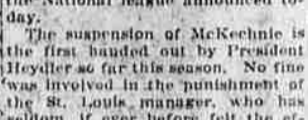
