

FEDERAL DREDGE SINKS; FOUR LOST

Collides with Liner Swinburne Off Clifton, Staten Island

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP).—The 2,000-ton government dredge Navesink, with a crew of 47 men, sank off Clifton, Staten Island, after colliding with the liner Swinburne. Four men were reported missing.

Twenty-five were taken to the marine hospital on Staten Island, where all but two remained for treatment.

Eighteen others swam ashore. It was reported, including Chief Engineer Chubb, in charge of the dredging operation.

The dredge, in command of Captain Anderson, was working in the double channel directly in the ocean steamship lane. She foundered in 45 feet of water.

First news of the accident was received in a radio message from the Swinburne as follows:

"U. S. government dredge sinking at pier 17, middle of channel. Loaded with men. Dredge settling and men swimming around. Adrift of White Star line and standard oil tanker Standard Arrow nearby. All lowered life boats."

This message was relayed to police headquarters which dispatched four police guards to the scene, five coast guard cutters also put out.

The Navesink was 250 feet long. She was built in 1908 at Sparrows Point, Md., and was valued at \$200,000.

thing almost unheard of in Eastern Oregon track history. The distance men were not handicapped much by the wind, and the discs and javelin men had it with them.

Hufford's only first place came in the shotput, a heave of 44 feet 3 1/2 inches that was made in the morning preliminaries, proving good enough to take first. Cox, of Union, after a poor start, took second with a heave nearly as mighty.

Had it not been for the wind Penland, of Pendleton, may have lowered the low hurdle record now held by Sherwood, and Crimmins, of Macfil, might have beaten Price's 440-yard record. Huff, expected to break the broad jump mark, only went 19 feet 4 inches.

In first places, Mac-Hi made four, La Grande 4, Pendleton 3, Prairie City 1 and Baker 2.

Closely Contested Barely has an Eastern Oregon meet been so closely contested. La Grande had hopes of winning by a greater margin but was handicapped by the recent illness of Evans, who was counted on for a few points, and by the soreness of Charlton's arm. Last year Charl-

ton got off a javelin throw of around 170 feet, but 146 feet was his best this year.

A large crowd witnessed the finals in the afternoon, and a fair-sized crowd saw the morning preliminaries. The finals were run off in 2 hours 20 minutes and the preliminaries in less than 2 hours.
