STOCKS SOAR IN BULLISH ATTACK

General Motors Hits New High — Other Stocks Go to High Levels

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP)—Refreshed by a two-day holiday, speculators for the advance today brought about another sweeping advance in prices on the New York stock exchange. Prices of active stocks were quickly bid up 2 to nearly 10 points with several individual transactions ranging from 5,000 to 18,000 shares. Radio opened \$7.75 a share higher at \$191 and General Motors showed an initial gain of \$6.25 at \$210, a new high record.

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP)—But modest volume of market offensive on the New York exchange today and "bears" rushed to cover as prices soared 42 to nearly \$15 a share. So great was the volume of trading that the ticker fell nearly 45 minutes behind the market by early afternoon. More than three score individual issues were lifted to new peak prices for the year or longer. There were no new developments over the weekend to explain the tremendous volume of buying.

Banks called about \$15,000,000 in loans by early afternoon but there appeared to be a large surplus of funds available at the renewal rate of 3 per cent on call loans. Electric Atlantic soared nearly 14 points to a new peak at 202 1/2. American bank note extended its gain to nearly 9 points by touching 137. Canadian Pacific climbed 7 1/2 points to 221, the highest price in 12 years, and Jersey Central sold at 135 for the first time since 1912. General Motors ran into heavy profit-taking after creating a new peak at 210, but held within a few points of that level. Gains of 2 to 5 points were scattered throughout the list.

The closing was strong. New favorites loomed up in late dealings, including the American Tobacco, International Combustion Engine, Peerless, Purdy Baking and Vanadium Steel shares, in which advances ran from 4 to 7 points. The Airplane stocks took a new flight into higher territory and there was further accumulation of "blue chips." Dupont selling above 400. Total sales approximated 4,500,000 shares.
