U. S. Position Given
WASHINGTON, May 8 (AP)—The state department made it clear today that the United States could consider acting as mediator between Japan and the nationalist government of China only if invited to do so by both sides.

SHANGHAI, May 8 (AP)—Nationalist Chinese troops are reported to have surrounded the Japanese in Tsinan. Heavy fighting is proceeding.

LONDON, May 8 (AP)—A Reuters dispatch from Shanghai says it is understood that the nationalist government is considering inviting the mediation of the United States in the present Chinese-Japanese conflict.

Concerned For Americans
PEKING, May 8 (AP)—Concern for Americans in Tsinan, where Chinese nationalists and Japanese troops clashed with heavy casualties was renewed today with the receipt of advices saying that fighting had been resumed. The Japanese chief of staff at Tsinan also sent a dispatch, dated yesterday, saying: "One American missionary killed."

The American legation could not verify this today and the belief was expressed that the dispatch was a repetition of an earlier rumor found to be erroneous.

TOKYO, May 8 (AP)—The Japanese cabinet has decided to dis-

patch a division of troops to Shantung, Shantung and the emperor's sanction is expected tomorrow. On war strength the division, known as the Nazora division, numbers from 15,000 to 18,000 men.
