CHANG CALLS OFF CHINESE CIVIL STRIFE

Japanese troops are reported to have cleared the Shanghai railway of all disturbing elements. Passenger service has been resumed.

JAPANESE DETERMINED PERKING, May 9 (AP)—The Japanese in Shanghai were determined today to enforce the demands of their ultimatum to the Chinese nationalist at all costs, official advice from Tsinan indicated. Fear for the safety of one American who was captured in the nationalist sweep across Shanghai, disappeared when a dispatch from Tientsin told of his escape. C. L. Osborne, of Columbus, O., a member of the staff of the Nazareth mission at Chaocheng, Western Shanghai, sent a telegram to Tientsin saying he had reached Kaifeng, capital of Honan province, safely.

An official Japanese advice from Tsinan at 8 o'clock this morning said a full had occurred in the fighting which began when the nationalists rejected the Japanese demands yesterday.

Taking advantage of this the Japanese were vigorously strengthening their defenses.
